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President's Letter

Dear Y - Sailors and Y - Friends

The Yngling enters his 23rd year and celebrates in Geneva his 12th World Championship.

When the new MAGAZINE is in your hands, with articles and interesting informations, pictures and results, we hope to satisfy especially YNGLING-Family. - However, it is regrettable that not all National Associations contribute on their part for these World-wide informations. Since the last Worlds in Tonsber, the communication of the I.Y.A. Committee was not as numerous as expected, this was due to my illness, but the Committe had been busy and had an important meeting in last December, discussing the problems and the guides for the future. The results of the polls from January will be published in the next Spot-Light.

The main interest for us will be – cooperation of all National Associations – that the Yngling preserves the status of a modern keelboat worldwide in a time, when many new boat-classes crowd the market. Otherwise we will try that the Yngling can obtain, the status of the Women-Sailing keelboat by IYRU. The combat will be hard and therefore it is absolutely necessary, that all – I repeat – all National Associations work together and communicate the tendencies of the National Authoroties. It is important, that we can anticipate in certain cases.

There is also an other wish I would like to pronounce: cooperation and information of the National Associations not only represents the Committee of I.Y.A., but also all other National Committees by the Home-News. So that everyone knows what happens, I want to remark, every article and NEWS is wellcomed by the I.Y.A. – from sailors or crew-members - every time - and not only form the National Y-Associations, but some of them have been asked for several times before getting an answer. Without your help it is not possible to get the whole world-wide outline.

With regards to the Sail-Labels situation in our class, I found out that a few of the sail-makers supply sails without Sail-Labels and for your information – such sails do not conform with our Class Rules!

Looking back to the '89 Worlds in Tonsberg/Norway we have to remark that this event was an excellent manifest of our Class representing the organisation at water and on land. Thanks to the organisation Committee of Tons-



berg Seilforening with his Chairmann Steinar Woien. The situation of Fjaerholemn is unique and all participants were very happy about the sun during the whole competition. Also King Olav Norway honored the Yngling-Class with his visit during the race. – We from the Committee regret that no boats from Austria and Germany did'nt take part in this event, especially from Germany in spite of their inscriptions. – The participation at the "Kieler Woche" was better than in the last years and we hope that this other great Event of the Yngling-Class finds in future a second puff.

In July Geneva will have the the next great meeting of the Yngling sailors and the Australian Women-Crew had allready annouced their participation / Number 12. I am happy to see you all again. – More information under view to Geneva!

I want to say now my sincere thanks to Claus Brask Thomson and Ralph Kinsbrunner for their cooperation and work in the background. OPENTING: 1. AGENDA

The President in declaring the meeting open, welcomed all national delegates.

2. ANNUAL REPORT

RESOLVED to adopt the provisional agenda as already circulated to all national Yngling associations. RESOLVED to approve the president's annual report as attached to these minutes and to be issued in the next

world-wide newsletter.

3. FINANCIAL:

RESOLVED to approve and adopt the audited financial statement for the period 5 October 1988 to 30 April 1989 as expressed in Swiss Francs currency and also the audit statement for the period 1 May to 4 October 1988, as expressed in Dutch Florins; both as attached to these minutes.

It was noted the latest accounting statements did not contain all the 1989 year boat stickers and sail label sales, which dues have since been settled; also the costs of the 1989 Yngling News currently being distributed, were not included in the period to 30. April 1989. A motion to levy all nations for a share of the Yngling News costs was left on the table as some nations considered any special levy should be pro-rata to the number of paid up

4. BUDGET:

RESOLVED to approve the 1989-1990 budget as attached to these minutes, showing Income from boat stickers and sail labels at Swiss Francs 24,000 and expenses also at Swiss Francs 24,000, resulting in a zero profit.

5. COMMITEE:

Unanimously RESOLVED to congratulate the President. Vice-President, Chief Measurer, Designer and Secretariat for their efforts on behalf of the Class during their year in office; with a special thanks from all nations for their work in producing the latest issue of the Yngling Guide.

6. ELECTION:

Unanimously RESOLVED to re-elect the International Yngling Association Committee: President Günther Schmidt-Ginzkey Switzerland, Vice-President Claus Brask Thomsen Denmark, Chief Measurer Ralph Kinsbrunner Austria

7. RULES

RESOLVED the following proposals be placed before the IYRU in August by the Chief Measurer for their November meetings at London -

- That our World Championship be classified as a "B" event for the purposes of advertising in the new IYRU rules.
- That we restrict advertising to spinnakers only (i.e. not on mainsails or jibs) which decision is subject to national postal vote after delegates have canvassed their members. This decision is as per Soling Class motion. It was noted that in IYA Class Rule 4.4.1 the word 'accepted' should be replaced by the word 'approved'.
- (iii) Update on where to place 1 template 385 is correct on IYRU stamped plans.
- (IV) Restriction on spinnaker cloth weight of 38 grams per square meter required by most nations; but agreed this to await the decision if IYRU in London during November following their measurement symposium in Paris where the various methods of verifying either the thickness or the weight of spinnaker cloth were discussed.
- Variation of the 1/2 and 3/4 widths mainsail checking positions to be expressed as per the new IYRU rules; also for jibs on the basis of maximum dimensions.

- (vi) Checking station for mast position 300 60 from breakwater 1/2 height to forward edge of mast It was generally felt this was not necessary except for control for world championchips /or major regattas.
- (vii) Conform to the change in IYRU rules for thickness of sail numbers and spacings i.e. new thickness 40 mm (old 55 mm) and new spacing minimum 60 mm (old 75 mm)
- (viii) That loose footed mainsails shall be prohibited.
- 8. ADVERTISING

It was noted our World Championship is a "B" event for the purposes of IYRU rules on advertsing which have changed with their new rules effective for 4 years form 1 March 1989.

9. PROGRAM:

RESOLVED the following major events be approved: WC 1990 Geneva, Switzerland from Circle de la Voile Club with course off Versoix, 13-20 July 1990; all as per Advance Notice distributed at Meeting WC 1991 Medemblik Holland form S.P.A. Regatta - exact dates to be finalised but will be 2nd or 3rd week of July 1991. WC 1992 possibility of south coast or west coast of Sweden; Ingemar Stromblad to issue a full report to next annual general meeting of IYA.

Mitropa Cup Venue of Lake Garda hat to be cancelled in 1989 but hopeful of participating there in 1990 and

beyond.

Womens Danish Championship for ladies only is held each year during August - contact Danish Yngling

Association.

IYRU sponsored Ladies Keelboat Regatta 1990: Ingemar Stromblad requested all national yngling associations to canvass their national yachting authorities / IYRU delegates to press for YNGLING CLASS for this new prestigous event, as Sweden wish to hold it at Vasteras during that city's 1.000 year celebrations, a brochure of which was distributed to all delegates. It was anticipated 60/70 ynglings, each nation being allowed 2 or 3 entrants and such an event would be advertised world-wide, to be held during period 22 July to 14 August 1990 (or enough time to drive from Geneva to Vasteras to compete) with ynglings being supplied from Scandinavian associations. Australian Nationals 27-31 December 1989 from RSYS on Sydney Harbour and also 27-31 December 1990 from RSYS on Sydney Harbour with all visitors most welcome to attend.

10. REVIEW:

RESOLVED to receive the President's up-date on progress of the Class worldwide with regard to both new and used boats. It was stressed it was the national yngling associations' responsibility to ensure that sailmakers attached new sail labels to each new sail.

11. DEVELOP-MENT: RESOLVED to receive the President's report on sponsorship for the class and on development.

12. OTHER BUSINESS:

Double Bottom Floor – RESOLVED the Designer investigate the costs of such a modification which, with the removal of the side tanks, addition of self bailers, could alter the centre of gravitiy of the yacht. If the Executive and the Designer felt such a 'kit' would be reasonably priced, then it was agreed that a prototype could be made up for display and participation as a special entrant for the new World Championship.

. CLOSURE:

The President thanked all delegates for their attendance, and thanked the Tonsberg Seilforening for the use of their facilities, and declared the meeting closed at 22.45 hours.

Class Measurer's Corner

Dear Friends,

to the best of my belief I can say that the framework of our International Yngling class rules seams to be a very good and stable system to hold the position of our class very close to a real idealistic one designe class, as far as this would ever be possible.

Only a few rule changes have been necessary in the last ten years, supporting the basic work of designer Jan Hermann Linge and the former IYA president Odd Hverven, who contributed considerable in the matter. So the rule changes we submitted to IYRU for approval last year, where only a certain adaptation. All of them have been accepted.

Most of the amendments were caused by a change of the appropriate international yacht racing rules or the new IYRU class fee policy. So, for instance the addendum of rule 3. 6. 1. regarding Spinnaker cloth weight is a reinstallment of the former existing specification of a minimum cloth weight.

The main sail amendment rule 3. 6. 2. 3 is only the creation of a new kind of width measurement due to make checks easier. There is no change at all, neither to shape nor sail area.

Only the rule 3. 6. 2. 8 is in fact a new one and should avoide the use of special main sail designes.

For the future we should consider some points which could be regarded for submission. A new kind of jib measurement seems to be necessary to make it more easier. This will be proved at the Geneva Worlds 1990 and can be submitted to IYRU in August. There will be as above no change in shape and area.

In other international classes, especially in the olympic ones, many efforts are made to investigate different mass concentrations of the hulls. This needs very intensive work beginning with collecting data from the existing number of yachts to find basic figures for fixing the limiting values.

I personally believe that this very expensive task will not make sense at all due to certain reasons:

There are only a few Yngling builders and the manufacturing of the hulls can be checked by measurers quite well.

The hull weight of 200 kg minimum in conjunction with the weight of the keel of appr. 310 kg on an exactly defined position, does not allow much deviation in the radius of gyration.

The proper position of the helmsman and the crew on deck with a weight of 240 kg or more, is much more important for winning or loosing a race, than the small band of possible mass variation.

So I will not recommend to follow the present trends in this matter.

But, what we should observe carefully is the developement of new sail cloths, as for instance the laminated ones. I guess that the "old" finished cloths will not be available anymore in the near future, especially the hard finished cloths due to pollution reasons.

Another well known problem is trying to be solved at the moment by a team of IYRU Measurers, how to check the cloth weight of finished sails without destroying the material. A possible approach could be by measuring the thickness with a micrometer, but first the experts have to find out adequate standard devices and procedures.

After that we could go ahead changing the appropriate rule by stating an equivalent thickness, instead of the weight per square meter.

27-31 DECEMBER 1989

A fleet of 19 boats contested the Nationals on Sydney Harbour conducted by the Royal Sydney Yacht Squadron. Sailed under beautiful conditions with winds ranging from moderate to fresh to light from every direction provided excellent and close racing.

Yngaling along a lot KA8 (Nev Wittey/Marcus Burke/James Mayo) Scored 5 wins, a second and a third. They were outstanding in all points of sailing rarely missing shifts. 2 1 1 1 1 1 3 = 3 pts. They will be back at the Worlds in 90 with a vengeance after finishing 6th in 89.

Second place KA3 The Hobbit (Christine Ingate-Marriott/Gordon Ingate/Hugh Ferrar) contested the lead strongly on many occasions, Keeping on their toes. 6 2 2 3 3 3 2 = 26.1 pts.

KA23 Polly (Jamie Neill/Matt Snedker/Grant Bozier) new-comers to the class, showed excellent boatspeed and good starts and won Heat 7. They aim to compete in the 90 Worlds. $3\,4\,3\,2\,4\,5\,1 = 30.4$ pts.

KA27 Koala Fire (Chris Harper/Christian Brook/Nick Brundin) finished 4th showing excellent boatspeed in the last 2 races. 4 3 6 5 11 2 disq = 55.4 pts. Chris unfortunately became another victim of the Flying 18 Ft Skiffs that continue to get confused between port and starboard.



Austria News

Review '89

In the '89 regatta season eight races were held in the Yngling class. The highlight was, no doubt, the Austrian Championship at the also internationally well known Union Yacht Club Attersee, from August 13 thru 18, 1989. It was probably one of the hardest and most exciting fights for the title. After four heats Stefan Frauscher OE 185 and Harry Fereberger OE 245 had two wins on their account, Frauscher another two good races and Fereberger one good placement and one DNS. Therefore Frauscher had to avoid another win of Fereberger in the fifth race. Permanent control over his competitor during the last race, which ended with a ONF for both of them, secured Stefan Frauscher and Peter Farbowski OE 185 the over all win and the Austrian Champion title.

Another pleasing fact in the '89 series was the participation of Swiss and German Yngling sailors in the three major events, the Alpencup, the Golden Yngling, and the Austrian Championhip.

For the first time in Austria a match race was organized by the Austrian Yngling Association, who invited all the austrian champions in the Olympic Classes and in the classes promoted by the national sailing authority äSV. The event was held on September 9th, 1989, in Ebensee, Lake Traunsee, where one can find similar wind conditions as at the Lake Lago di Garda in Italy. Too bad that the already reigning Champion Stefan Frauscher was knocked out in the second heat. Winner of the Race of the Champions was the European Champion in the FINN-Class Hans Spitzauer.

One aim of the AYA was to show sailors from other classes how easy it is to do real good and high-leveled racing on Ynglings, which was reflected from the competitors in good gybing actions at the buoies, lots of tacking on the windward and exciting start ceremonies to have the edge on the rival.

Denmark's Report

The YNGLING Class moves to the West

For many years the Yngling Class in Denmark has been concentrated at Oresund (the Sound) near Copenhagen. Almost 100 Ynglings are situated here in the Yachtclubs on the coastline, which is only about 60 kilometers long. As a result many boats are always participating in the races and it is one of the reasons for the Danes very good international results during the 80's. In the last few years there has been a growing interest for the Yngling Class also in Jutland (the Western part of Denmark), and this interest exploded in 1989, where the Open Danish Championship was arranged by Marselisborg Havneforening in Aarhus (the second largest city in Denmark) with 57 participating Ynglings. Also the Open Danish Junior Championship (age 19 or below) was sailed in Jutland, and it had, with close to 30 boats, a new participant record. The interest is especially big among the yachtclubs, but also some private owned Ynglings have started sailing races in Jutland.

WOMEN SAILING COMES UP

For many years only a few women have been racing, but in the last five years, more and more women have started competing in races.



In 1989 Dansk Yngling Club arranged the Open Danish Ladie Championship for the fifth time. 20 teams including one Norwegian team have participated in this great event. Each year it gets more and more popular, and as a result of this event, the number of female participants in the open Yngling events have increased every year, since we started five years ago. Even though many of the participants are usualy sailing in other keelboat or dinghy classes, every year some are staying in the Yngling Class. The IYRU Women Sailing Committee is working on an official IYRU WORLD WOMENS CHAMPI-ONSHIP in keelboat. The plan is, that the first event shall be arranged in 1992. The Dansk Yngling Club is, together with the IYA, working on a possibility, that one of the classes shall be the Yngling Class.

Ranking List 1989

The Danish Ranking List 1989 is based on the results of 9 races, including the Kiel Week and the World Championship. It was of no surprise, that the 1989 WORLD and DUTCH CHAMPION Niels Christian Andersen was on top of the list, but only a small margin ahead of Jørgen Ring and Søren Ovesen, finishing 2nd and 3rd.





Sweden's Activity

The Swedish Yngling Association, or SYF (short for Svenska Ynglingförbundet) has now been readily established. It has been formally recognised by the national authority, Svenska Seglarförbundet or the Swedish Sailing Association. The number of members was 18 persons during 1989, which is supposed to increase at least to 30 this year. The number of Yngling Yachts in Sweden is yet not fully known, but so far 11 have been traced, of which 8 were formally registered with boat stickers in 1989.

Last year the first national championship Riksmästerskap was raced, which will be followed up with another one during 1990. It is our hope that this regatta during the very first days in June will attract crews from nearby countries. Several Danish yachts were present last year and we heard from Norwegian crews that they were interested in coming. Both of these countries are very welcomed, but we would also be very happy to see other nations.

In order to facilitate German Yachts or yachts from other countries even further away, we have managed to make a deal with the Nordö-Link shipping line, operating between Travemunde and Malmö. This deal will provide all crews with a boat-cover displaying the Nordö-Link name with a first class cruise including cabin and food at a very favourable rate. More details will be released with the formal invitation and Notice of Race.

We had hopes to arrange an IURY World Women's Keelboat Championship during 1990. The Västeras JK applied to become the organizer together with the Swedish Sailing Association. However, this very good idea was turned down due to a decision by the the IYRU Class Policy and Organizing Committee. This was a pity as such a regatta in the Yngling would have meant a lot of publicity, not only in Sweden but world-wide.

We are now in the process to promote interest in Sweden by showing the Yngling at the Swedish Boat Show in Stockholm for the second year. In the long run this will stimulate everyone who is a racing fan, because the Yngling is just the right yacht for the common person, man or woman, with a normal purse and car to pull a trailer to the regattas.

Once again, welcome to race in Sweden at Borstahusen this summer.



Jim Leslie won the championship series at Minnetonka, with Dick York second. This writer managed to edge out 1st for overall Season's Record, 3rd in the championship series.



History of Racing Championship 1978-1990

It all started during 1977 when IYA was formed and Australia had been in contact with Odd Hverven its President regarding the application for International Status.

We remember it well – Malcolm Barlow (Founder of Barlow Winches) was reminiscing about his participation at Denmark (74) and Bert Nieuwendyke produced the Dutch report of the 1977 event at Staveren: the idea of participating became a reality and what better place to venture than to Geneva. Judge Des Ward, our AIYA President would be attending, and our long time coach/crew Jim Wort was available to guide us along the way. Second thoughts about how we would perform -



well, we had 12 years in the strong Dragon fleet behind us and it was a case of 'nothing ventured nothing gained'. Assistance from Rob Antill of North Sails (his father produced a set of sails for our Bluebird class yacht many years ago) gave us a beautiful set of sails, particularly the light jib which we have been trying to perfect again ever since.

Travel arrangements and the problems of where to stay and where to eat were put in hand early as flights during the European summer are quite heavily booked. What to wear afloat and ashore was discussed, how to train for the light airs of Geneva became the major talking point as the KAI team (Phil Mathews) also advised their participation, and our crew Jim located was in Melbourne.

Well it all happened; we had a great regatta, met many sailors, learnt a little and hopefully our standard improved. It did not take much prompting to accept the Norwegians invitation to come to Kristiansand – we shall get you boats – and to sail NI at Marstrand, Sweden that following year with our new crew Roger Wingett who then did 1980 at Attersee Austria and again at Hanko Norway in 1981.

David Ward had joined the fleet and training commenced in earnest, as Jim had made the comment we would have to learn to sail in the fresh winds that prevail in Norway. A lovely photo of Jan H Linge with us dockside reminds us forever of their enthusiastic support and ever so especially the help and assistance of Lars Hafsmoe.

Stuart Primrose joined us during the end of 1981 with the view to participating in 1982 and what better way than to sail the Europeans at Hoorn July and then the Worlds at Sarasota USA in November. Back to Denmark in 1983, it was inevitable we would return to Versoix for 1984 year (KA12 Dr. Stephen Wilson also raced)


- the lake sailing again where Lars Hafsmoe invited us to try Asker in 1985
- the protected Oslo fjord area where our Swedish connection commenced with the Stromblads.

Crew was a problem for Asker until Nev Wittey advised he would be doing the Laser Worlds and what better way than to/race Worlds, Laser Dutch and Swedish Nationals as well. It was in Norway that Nev came to grips with the rules and how pleased we were to hear of his appointment effective 1 Janury 1990 as an International Judge, having watched his progression form a young lad in the Dragon Class through his participation in the first Youth Worlds and in our Yngling Class in Australia.

Retiring finally, not really as we dicided to go to Muiden with Stuart again in 1986 – quite different sailing conditions to o local Sydney Harbour which is quite deep in places. Back to Attersse in 1987 saw us with an all girl team – Jude Micklewright, and our enthusiastic new Australian President Chris Harper who is now a confirmed participant, led the teams in 1988 to Rungsted, where Seathan Smith joined us as a 'rookie' crew and has since become the Class 'rookie' helmsman of the year. The half model plaque then presented took a tumble in the Newcastle earthquake!!

1989 at Tonsberg Norway was again the real open water sailing which we lack at Sydney Harbour and it was a marvellous idea of the Danes to get us a crew – Bjorn Endresen - thank you for sailing with the "little old ladies", it was a pleasure to have you aboard for the few heats we raced. Maybe our minds were on the KA8 team as they laboured to a creditable 6th place. Also there were KA2 Paul Melia and KA27 Chris Harper.

The main point we wish to raise is that all our crews may have left our team but have remained in the class either helming or crewing and handing on their experiences to all the teams now.



competing. Also these past 12 years we have raced whether it be lakes, protected waters or open sea, even though our preference is for light weather.

We watched the Dragon Class European circuit during the summer of 1962 and always hoped that one day we would be able to do it ourselves – and this has been possible in Yngling which we have loved from the time we dicided to purchase Y/KA2 MISSY in 1974 which we sold in 1986 to purchase Y/KA25 CANNY. Y/KA23 POLLY was our second Yngling during 1984 and when she was also sold during 1986 to Chris Harper, we purchased Y/KA26 MERRY who arrived at Christmas time.

Bob Marshall with various crews is now in his fifth season of racing our second Yngling. The question of a Yngling in Europe was always contemplated as each year arrived but it was felt better to have the 2 Ynglings in Australia where it would assist the local fleet. There had really never been a great problem about the loan of a boat and we sincerely thank all those kind owners over the years who have so generously made their own boats available to us.

Also a thank you to the stalwarts of the Class who also compete every year such as Jorgen Ring who are always so kind and helpful if we need assistance at a regatta.

What more to say than we plan to sail Geneva 1990 with Jude Micklewrigt who has re-joined our team, so we shall see you all on the Lake in July.




View to Geneva
