

The agenda was approved with item 43 to be considered after item 7.

Ingemar Strömblad was elected as chairman and Chris Harper as Minutes Secretary.

The President's Annual Report was tabled and accepted.

The current financial statement and Auditors' report was tabled and accepted. Of note higher costs were due to the Olympic meetings attended by the President.

The Executive Committee was discharged.

The 2001–2 Budget was tabled and after much discussion the following was approved:

sail labels are to cost 30 CHF; membership fees are to cost 25 CHF; championship fees are to cost 25 CHF; advertising target is 12,500 CHF (rates not to be advertised but to be negotiated); the Secretary is to seek an IYA sponsor to be promoted by all NYAs.

Ingemar Strömblad was elected for 1 year as President.

Ellie Field was elected for 1 year as Vice President.

Chris Harper was elected for 2 years as Secretary.

Rene Steimer remained elected for another year.

Fasser and Leunenberger were appointed as Auditors for another year.

Bruce Chafee remained elected for another year as Webmaster.

The President raised the issue of conflict of interest of builders being members of the Technical Committee.

The meeting saw no conflict of interest and endorsed the present committee and encouraged the builders to be present as expert consultants.

Per Thorshoj was elected as Chief Measurer.

John Ingalls representing North America.

Peter Schoebel representing Europe.

Jorgen Ring representing Scandinavia.

Chris Harper representing Australasia.

Jan Linge Designer

Ingemar Strömblad was elected as ISAF Delegate.

Each nation was encouraged to find International Measurers.

The President will talk to ISAF to see how new Measurers can be achieved in North America.

No amendments to the IYA constitution were proposed.

It was decided that applications for entries shall be in writing and sent by registered mail.

All other correspondence can be via email or the web, eg. NORs and SIs.

The Technical committee tabled their recommendations for a keel mould to be developed by Jan Linge.

Discussion ensued and the builders were not pleased as they were not consulted.

The meeting decided that keel moulds would not be used and ISAF should speed up the delivery of the 5 new keel templates with tighter tolerances.

The deck renovation proposal from Holland was re-referred to the Technical Committee to advise on how deck repairs could be executed.

The full length sail batten proposal was rejected.

The meeting approved the USA proposal of 645kgs for low floor boats. (The same rules as for high floor boats.)

The meeting thanked the Secretary for the excellent production of the Yngling Magazine.

The meeting also congratulated the Webmaster for his work on the website.

The President is to contact ISAF so that the class can be linked under both International and Olympic Classes.

Also not to link to Denmark but to link only to www.yngling.org.

Brunnen WC 2002 is to have up to 10 short course races, 4 to count, maximum of 3 per day and no starts after 3pm on the last day.

The number of teams to race (quota for each nation) shall be decided by a postal vote.

The 2003 WC will be held in Warnemunde, Germany in July 2003.

The 2004 WC will be held in Sydney, Australia in December 2003–January 2004.

European Championships will be decided at the 2002 AGM.

A list of judges suitable to the Yngling Class is to be forwarded by each NYA to the President before August 31, 2001.

It is noted that we cannot influence the Eurolympics.

It was decided to have an Open Rankings System with prizes.

The meeting approved the President to apply for the ISAF Women's Keelboat WC.

The meeting approved the President to apply for the ISAF World Sailing Games 2002 at Marseilles, France.

Ellie Field reported that a women's committee meeting will be held on the 19th July, 2001.

Weight limits for sailors is to be done by a postal vote (with the nation's quota).

Jan Linge stated that his moulds have gone to Borrensen DEN.

Jan Linge stated that Portiers moulds have gone to Mader GER.

Bill Abbott CAN stated that he is happily building Ynglings now and commented that a weight limit for women was not needed.

Chris Harper stated that despite rumours and innuendos from the ISAF sailing committee, the AIYA is still building good Ynglings.

No report from Mader.

Per Thorshoj commented that Borrensen Boats was building about 1 per week.

De Wolf is going fine with on-going orders.

No report from Nautivela.

General Business:

Austria has invited sailors to the Lake Garda Regatta April 10–13, 2002.

The rules update is to be finished September 1, 2001. The President and Chief Measurer are working on them with ISAF.

Builders instructions will also be issued by ISAF.

The President will discuss with ISAF if low floor Ynglings can still be produced.

Pumping rules were discussed.

The AGM 2002 will be held on the 19th July, 2002 at 15.00, preceded by the Technical Committee meeting at 10.00.

The meeting was closed.







New members

My first pleasure when writing to you is to welcome all new members. For the first time we are fortunate to have a great number of new members from many new nations. I think of women from Canada, Great Britain, Ireland, France, Spain, Greece and Poland who I met at the European and World Championships last year. But there were also a great number of new female sailors from the already established countries such as Germany, Norway, Italy and Sweden. Welcome all of you to the Yngling Class!

We also wish all women that will join in 2002 very welcome. I am sure that Yngling sailors will do everything they can to help you around to have a good time in sailing the Yngling.

European Championship in Italy

The European Championship 2001 was sailed on Lake Garda. The number of participants was a record 75 boats with many women crews that took the chance to try their ability. The results showed that many of the new women had already learnt a lot about the Yngling. The venue was a success with its beautiful setting in the north part of the lake. The little village Riva del Garda was friendly and distances short between hotels and the regatta harbour. I think the Yngling sailors and the Host Club Officials went along very well in a friendly atmosphere. It went so well that there will be an Yngling Regatta again in April 2002. Many grateful thanks to all of you involved in the running of this successful event.

World Championship in the United States

There was an Yngling World Championships in the U. S. around 20 years ago, according to rumours with a lot of problems. The 2002 Worlds in Newport, Rhode Island, on the contrary was a very well run regatta with everything one can wish from this world known sailing centre. Most of it thanks to the Fields family and the volunteers they had engaged. There were plenty of women crews racing and silver medallist was the famous US sailor Betsy Allison with crew. At the Award Dinner on the lawn of the New York Yacht Club in the sunset we were honoured by the presence of the ISAF President Paul Henderson who gave the gold medal to Christoph Skolaut from Austria as the 2001 World Champion. Congratulations both of you including the crews. I say that because a good team with devoted crew is really a must.

The 2001 Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting was as usual a long one. I guess everyone sees an opportunity to speak and make proposals. However, proposals must be sent to IYA in writing 6 weeks before the meeting, which some seem to forget. Otherwise decisions cannot be taken (IYA Rule 9.1).

The NAYA, i.e. the North American Yngling Association had changed name to the US Yngling Association. A new National Yngling Association (NYA) had been formed in Canada, the Canadian Yngling Association, which was recognised and given voting rights. New NYAs are very welcome in the future and the existing NYAs will welcome you as this way an even stronger and more active Yngling Class will emerge.

The meeting decided after a long discussion to raise the membership fee to become 25 CHF for 2002. Also the championship fee and the sail label fees were changed to 25 and 30 CHF respectively. The increased fees will help to cover future costs. The possibilities to attract advertising and sponsors is much better as Olympic Class and our Secretary Chris Harper will seek out these possibilities during the next 12 months.

The ISAF Meetings in November

There were a number of issues to be discussed and decided upon for the Yngling Class this year, mainly concerning the future Olympics for the women.

The most important one was the issue on crew weight. The first committee to discuss it was the Keel Boat Committee, which unanimously decided in favour of a crew weight of 205 kgs or an average of some 68 kgs. The reason for this was a strong feeling that ability should be promoted and not heavy weight. Reference was made especially to other keelboats (Star and Soling) in which crew weight is considered a problem. Later on the Women's Committee came to the same decision followed by all other committees including the final decision made by the Council. Personally I think this decision reflects the fact that sailing in general is weight sensitive and that ISAF wanted to be sure that athletes from all would be

from nations in which the average weight of young women is much less.

Another important issue was the Open Fleet relative to the new Women Fleet with Olympic status. It now became obvious that a majority wanted the women to be separated to avoid any risqué of team racing. Therefore our next World Championship being a Qualifying Event for the 2004 Olympics must be raced with a separate start for women.

ISAF also decided that for the Olympics 2004 only Ynglings with the raised double bottom is to be allowed. I think that is very good as the self-bailing ability makes it a better racing boat.

The Class Rules

Our Class Rules have been under severe scrutiny. Our proposal in August 2000 was accepted already in November 2000 but was never issued by ISAF due to intense investigations and scrutiny, mainly by the ISAF Sailing Committee. An improved proposal therefore was presented to ISAF in August 2001, which included a common racing weight of 645 kgs according to the definition in the Equipment Rules of Sailing. That was accepted. We are now waiting for the new rules to be printed and available for practical use this season.

A gyration test shall be introduced for the Olympic Regatta. The method for that will be developed during 2002 and the purpose is to be sure that the weight distribution is the same for all boats. A gyration test is considered to be the best way to avoid nations from "optimising" boats. When the result from this development is ready it will be possible for the Yngling Class to adopt a rule to be used for all boats independent of age.

At last

I wish you all a happy year 2002 and many interesting regatta days.


Preview 2002:


Of all the resort towns around the lake Brunnen is perhaps most dramatically located, snug in a right-angled corner of the shore between the crests of the "Rigi" and the scarps of the "Fronalpstock". Vistas from its jetty are stupendous, looking the length of the "Urnersee" south to the snowy peaks around the "Gotthard"; directly across to the misty cliffs of "Seelisberg", with the "Uri-Rotstock" and "Titlis" behind; and east the length of the "Vierwaldstättersee" to fardistant "Luzern". Brunnen basks at the head of a wind tunnel which draws the warm "Föhn" wind from the Mediterranean up to the north, frequently turning the "Urnersee" choppy and stormy - rapidly fluctuating weather conditions mean that it's not unknown to look south to glorious sunshine on the high alps and east pelting rain over Luzern. The other prevalent Wind situation is the thermic winds from the north to down to the south.

On the shore of the Urnersee, and visible from Brunnen, is a flapping swiss flag planted in the "Rütli Meadow", a sloping



patch of grass above the shoreline that holds a unique, almost mystical, significance for the Swiss. Legend and national pride says that it was here on August 1st, 1291, that representatives from the three forest cantons around the lake – Uri, Schwyz and Nidwalden – met amidst continuing Habsburg repression to sign a pact of eternal mutual defence, thereby laying foundation of the Swiss Confederation as it stands today.

In the middle of this historical place and hopefully with excellent weather and wind conditions we will present you the next



World Championship. The Organisation committee "Regattaverein Brunnen" and the Swiss Yngling Association are looking forward to an exiting and unforgettable event and we are all happy to see you soon.

A fleet of 19 boats (9 all-female crews) contested the Nationals. The entire regatta was held in shifty gradient breezes ranging from 6 to 15 knots. The oldest boat in he fleet, AUS14, sailed by Michael Nash, Garth Davies and Matthew Middleton, established an early dominance with a bunch of 4 or 5 others nipping at their heels. The New Zealand (NZL1) team of Alesha Thorpe, Michelle Vinsen and Sonya Swinburne put the frighteners on the Aussies with consistent placings in the top 5 throughout the regatta.

Race wins were shared between AUS40 (Melanie Dennison, Fiona Herbert and Jeni Whalan) with 4, AUS14 and AUS48 (Nicky Bethwaite, Karyn Gojnich and Kristen Kosmala) with 3 each, and 1 to both the Kiwis (NZL1) and AUS41 (David Ward, Peter Lowndes and Byron Ross). On the last day of racing 5 crews were in a position to win the championship.

By the last race, this had narrowed to 3 – AUS40 and AUS48. A win to AUS48 in a gusty southerly clinched the title, with 2nd place on countback going to AUS40. 3rd went to AUS14, followed by AUS41 and NZL1.

DANISH

New policy set by the Danish Yngling Organisation.

A lot of things have changed in Denmark since the Yngling has been chosen as an Olympic Class. In many ways this decision has had an effect on the interest for the Class in Denmark.

Many of the best sailors have left the Class in favour of other classes. Some of these sailors have been involved in coaching – either in Denmark or abroad – while others have chosen to stop their active career. On the other hand we have a few new women crews entering the Class.

The requirement for used boats abroad for new women crews had the effect that many boats for a period could be sold for a considerably higher price than the years before, which naturally has helped take such decisions.

Boerresen in Vejle are now building our boats, but since January 2002 no new boats have been sold to Danish sailors.

It is well known that we have always had a lot of Ynglings owned by Danish Yacht Clubs and used for Youth sailors. This has not changed but the international trend has had its effect. Yacht Clubs with low activity among Youth sailors in the Yngling have sold some or all their boats.

The result of these changes has been a fall-off in sailors and boats registered by the Danish Yngling Organisation.

While the international development has been a great step forward, Denmark has experienced a major fallback among Youth sailors in the Yngling Class. Most likely due to the uncertainty of possibilities for the Class in the years to come, and undoubtedly caused by the fact that it will be very difficult to keep up with the best without having new and top-tuned equipment.

The fact that that many of the well-known faces have retired has also marked the social life and the Class Organisation has not been particularly active during the period up to and after the selection of the Yngling.

The Committee has changed in DYK

Almost all the committee members in the Danish Yngling Organisation has been replaced. A new board has been selected with Jørgen Ring as the president – well supported by a few Heads of Youth Organisations with great experience within racing and the work done for youth in Danish Yacht Clubs.

We are facing a new period with new challenges. The fast growing international competition gives possibilities for racing and the corresponding interest with the media gives new possibilities for the yacht clubs to develop Youth Organisations.

The new Committee has therefore chosen to pick up the challenge and decided to use the upcoming season to test new ideas, using the international growth, and set a higher focus on the popular work with the Danish Youth sailors.

More Races but fewer Regattas

In the regatta calendar for the season 2002 we have tried to take known international regattas into consideration and for that reason we have left out a considerable amount of regattas in Denmark. This should support the need for larger and better Regattas and further more, make room for more efficient training of our youth sailors.

We will make changes so that we can have more races on shorter tracks. The dates for International regattas have been chosen so foreign sailors can participate by driving directly from other regattas close to Denmark.

The Nordic Championship will take place from in Bogense only 200 Km from Kiel. The Danish Womens Championship from 2002 until after the Olympics, will be held in Rundsted just north of Copenhagen together with other Olympic Classes. Both places have perfect water for races.

The Open Danish Championship will be held in Horsens giving international competitors from everywhere a greater possibility to join.

For our youth sailors we will try a new concept with a Danish Youth Championship setting new standards for the social activities during a competition.

A future with numbers of possibilities

The upcoming season will tell us what direction we are heading, but already during the first months of this year we have leaned that new private boats and new members will join. Other Yacht Clubs will start using the Yngling in local youth organisations and together with the Danish Sailing Association training possibilities have been improved considerably – especially during the winter season the Training Centres set up by the Danish Sailing Association have intensified the interest.

We are looking forward to the new season with great hope for the Class and hoping that the new international interest will give us all new experiences and new circles of acquaintances across the world.

Next year the Championship will be held in Medemblik and we hope to see there a lot of foreign teams again.

2001 in Germany

In 2001, we enjoyed our first public appearance with our booth on the "Boat 2001" exhibition in Duesseldorf. The facets of the then still unfamiliar Olympic excitement became more than evident as we were faced with quite controversial opinions and reactions to the decision. We are looking forward to the continuation of this discussion on our booth at the "Boat 2002" in January 2002.

Our "Deutschland Cup" in May 2001, organised in the pre-Olympic period, represented the next highlight as it provided the best possible opportunity to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of the NYA using the facilities of the WSVRh in Duisburg. We counted 26 teams from Germany, the Netherlands and Switzerland at the Lohheider Lake. Four days long, sailors good moods, the weather and of course the side attractions guaranteed the success of the NYA's 25th Anniversary event. And although we were not in a position to welcome new women crews in Duisburg a lot of contacts intensified – even on an international level.

Within the first year after the nomination, the Olympic spin secured us a larger selection of regatta areas. For the forthcoming season, both divisions - the Olympic and the non-Olympic - will benefit of even more interesting opportunities. For instance, internationally recognised events such as the Kieler Woche (up to now open to women only but as soon as we have 25 boats to start it can be opened to mixed crews in the non-Olympic division also), the Warnemünder Woche – German Women Championship (with participants from Russia) and the Travemünder Woche should be mentioned. Simultaneously, our class continues to grow as far as the numbers of women crews and mixed crews are concerned.

Our German women teams were successful right from the start of the season at the European Championship at the Lake Garda, and proved their skills again and again throughout the season. Paul Niemeyer, the driving force behind the development of the German class association, was named Honorary President of the DYKV according to the members' wishes. The new presiding team will gladly take advantage of his rich experience if the need arises.

We thank all leaving members of the presiding committee for the time and energy that they invested in leading our class and promoting our interests. We took their work for granted much too often due to the fact that they fulfiled their tasks so efficiently.

We wish our new presiding committee a good start and of course good luck for taking successful decisions.

We are all looking forward to exciting competitions in interesting regatta areas under the best possible conditions! But just in case everything doesn't go as planned, do not worry, try again and keep your heads up.

Danish Champion in Norwegian Boat

Mads Christensen of Denmark helmed NOR 400 and became the Nordic Champion in Aasgaardstrand 2001. It has been a strange year for the Norwegian Yngling fleet, but there are plenty of positive signs for the future. More girls show interest, and the Norwegian Sailing Federation (NSF) gives Yngling a higher priority than earlier, and besides, the social environment is great as always in the native country of the Yngling.

The Norwegian Cup had a slow start this year and there were times we were worried there wouldn't be enough teams for the Norwegian Championship, but as the season went on, the number of participating boats increased and we had a good summer after all. NOR 326, Joakim Skovly, Bjarne Salberg and Andreas Brunvoll, won the cup for the third year in a row. NOR 401, Carl Anton Stroem, Petter Aursnes and Kristian Aursnes came second, followed by NOR 247, Gunn Kari Sangholdt, Simen Granviken and Olav Gjervan.

The Kings Cup, each year given to one class within the Norwegian Sail Association, was this year dedicated to the Yngling class. This attracted quite a few previous Yngling sailors in addition to new ones. The host for

the Championship 2001 was the beautiful town of Kristiansand located in the south of Norway. Sailing was tough with tricky local conditions and strong winds. No surprise that the boys in NOR 400 took the gold medal and the Kings Cup. It was exciting to see the girls in NOR 392, our hope for Athens, getting an excellent 4th position overall, even coping with the really heavy wind conditions.

The Nordic Championship was good with nearly 30 participating teams and as usual we were visited by teams from our dear neighbours, Sweden and Denmark. NOR 400 caught the gold with a Danish helmsman this year, Mads Christensen. The beautiful village of Aasgaardstrand arranged an excellent championship with good sailing in light conditions.

We have seen a number of girls coming into the class during the season, and we hope there are more to come. As of now we have only one team aiming for Athens, the girls in NOR 392 from Asker. They are training in Greece this winter and we hope to see them on ISAF's ranking for Yngling, as Norway is still very much absent.


It has been a long lasting tradition of The Norwegian Sailing Federation (NSF) to have a separate Norwegian Championship for women each year. The type of boat varies, but this year it was obvious it had to be Yngling. It was a good championship with many teams, good wind and promises from NSF they would try their best to make it Yngling next year as well. The latest rumours is that the Kings Cup will be dedicated to this event next year, and it will most likely be sailed Yngling again.

Each year at the end of the season The Norwegian Yngling Club has the "sailors of the year" awards in various categories. With all the 'fuss' (don't get us wrong girls!) there has been about the girls this year, we decided to create a new award; "men's team of the year"! The award went to NOR 401, Carl Anton Stroem, Petter Aursnes and Kristian Aursnes for making an effort and being the only Norwegian boat in the worlds this year.





SWISS REPORT

Review 2001:

The great and numerous participation of Swiss boats in the national- and international races during this year was a positive sign for the big event next year – The Yngling World Championships. But let me first review the season 2001.

The first preparation for the new sailing season was the "dolce vita regatta" at the Lake Garda followed by the official European Championships where 9 Swiss boats tried to collect qualification points for the next world championships. The wind (up to 6 BF) and the rough sea were a real test for the teams and boats. Henrik Dannesboe, SUI 5, (26th) achieved the best Swiss result in the field of 80 boats.

Beat Meloni, fleet chief of lake Zurich together with the well-known international Star sailor Daniel Schroff organised an excellent trim and regatta training. The warm temperature (19°C) and the 3 to 4 BF made this event a great second preparation run.

Good participants (average 16 boats) in an excellent mood and with moderate winds attended two further regattas in May and

beginning of June on the lake of Zurich. The organisation of these two events was done by the regatta teams of the Sailing Club Zurich and the Yachting Club Horgen. The first highlight of the season was the already legendary regatta "Port-o-Böiu" on the lake of Hallwil, organised by the Sailing Club Hallwil, due to fine wind forces and a great barbecue evening. The winner of this event was once more Henrik Dannesboe with Simon Eichenberger.

On the two following weekends there were high level regattas on the lake of Thun organised by the old fashioned Yacht Club of Thun. The first weekend was the "Tune up" race and the second was the official Swiss Championship. With winds up to 6 BF and international participants on both weekends, we competed on a high level.

Once again the teams from Austria were absolute winners of the international Swiss Championships and were excellent sailors. With five gold medals out of eight races the Cup went to Klaus Diem and Thomas Giesinger. The fabulous second place was taken by the local matadors from the lake of Thun, Christoph and Claudia Kohlschütter and Marc Bichsel, SUI 203. Another highlight of this season was the race on the lake of Uri which was the dress rehearsal for the coming World Championships 2002 organised by the Regatta Club of Brunnen led by Gregor Zurfluh. With thermal winds of 3-4 BF from the north (always between noon and 16.00) the international race field could compete in five races at a high level. It was a good event to first experience the tricky wind conditions on this wonderful lake. The first place went out of Switzerland and was taken by the German Olympic team with Kirstin Wagner, Anna Höll, and Veronika Lochbrunner. Once more the best team from Switzerland taking second place was the experienced crew with Thomas and Helen Huber and Markus Jäggi.

As in the previous years Thomas and Helen Huber, SUI 447 dominated the whole season with their good results in all races and won the Swiss ASPROY Cup as well.

All in all it was a wonderful sailing season with good weather and wind conditions and lots of fun with the Swiss Yngling sailors and we are looking forward to a great season coming up.





USAEPORT

2001 was a very busy year, and full of changes, for Yngling sailing in America! The Olympic selection has influenced our class in many ways (almost all positive), and hosting the worlds was a keystone of our busy racing calendar.

In recent years the North American Yngling Association has been cultivating growing interest in Canada. This year we decided Canada was ready to stand on its own, so NAYA was split into the United States Yngling Association, and the Yngling Association of Canada. The aim is to allow Canada to grow more under its own direction. We hope that the enthusiastic participation of Canadian boats in USA events – and in Canadian events – is an indication of this beginning.

Olympics has brought more sailors into the U.S. fleet. We have ten or so new women's teams, and others expressing interest in joining the group. These new sailors have brought elite-level competition to our fleet, as well a a bevy of friendly new faces.

Importantly, as the class has welcomed Olympics-aspiring women into our fleet, the women have welcomed the class into their world. Every regatta in North America is open to all (women, men, mixed), to the satisfaction of all. Where the U.S. coaches need to rank women for their team, they are scoring the women independently. While I recognise that this might not be as easy in some countries, I urge all NYA presidents to use our experience as a positive example.

Clearly the most dramatic impact of Olympics in the U.S. is on our regatta schedule. In most years our only national event has been our North American Championship. In 2001 we enjoyed 5 major U.S. events, plus our first year at "CORK" in Canada, plus hosting the Worlds. Already our 2002 schedule includes 11 regattas in the U.S., plus a couple of Canadian events. Moreover, the competitiveness of the American women is attracting international competition: our Rolex Miami Olympic Classes Regatta comprised crews from 5 nations (OK, the warm February sunshine of Florida didn't hurt either)! Of course the 2001 Worlds in Newport was the highlight of Yngling racing in the U.S.A. 45 boats, from a record 13 countries, competed in varying conditions in Rhode Island Sound. Since this was our first worlds as an Olympic class, the fleet included many new faces, of women from around the world and from other classes. Nonetheless, Yngling regulars Christoph Skolaut, Georg Skolaut and Wolfgang Riha (from Austria) emerged victorious, vanquishing both their previously slippery grips on the Yngling cup, and strong challenges from Yachtswomen of the Year and Olympic medallists. The party highlight of the Worlds was surely the dinner evening at Rosecliff mansion, one of the opulent marble "cottages" overlooking the ocean.

Our 2001 North Americans was also an international affair. As in the Worlds, American women made known to the world that they will be a strong force in Olympiccampaign competition. American women took the top three spots, led by 470 and Europe sailor Courtenay Becker-Dey and crew Suzy Leech and Linda Wennerstrom.

Another result of Olympic status for our class is increased activity in sail development by American lofts. North Sails (Rhode Island) and Ullman are applying experience from Rolex Yachtwomen of the Year, Olympic medallists, and America's Cup veterans.

We invite you all to come to America to race in 2002! Our Newport charter boats will be available for most American events throughout 2002, at very reasonable charter fees (especially for events in Newport, which require no transportation costs). Please see our up-to-date information at http://usa.yngling.org.


