- 1. Meeting started at 3:00pm 16 July 2004.
- 2. AUS Peter Lowndes, DEN Jørgen Ring, GER Sabine Schedlinski, NED Huub de Haer, USA Bruce Chafee, SWE Mattias Dahlström, SUI Helene Huber. In attendance, Ingemar Strömblad President, Henrik Gravesen Vice President, Chris Harper Secretary, John Ingals TC.

Apologies, AUT proxy is held by Henrik Gravesen.

- 3. Ingemar Strömblad chaired the meeting and Chris Harper became the minutes secretary.
- Slovenia has applied to become a NYA member. The application was signed by Bostjan Antoncic. Bostjan was offered associate membership. Slovenia will be approved once formalities are done.
- Agenda approved with new items under general business – European Youth Championship – signing of Olympic Agenda – Appointment of Executive Secretary.
- 6. Minutes of last AGM & EGM were approved.
- 7. The Annual Report 2004 was tabled and approved. As a result of the ensuing discussion the following motion was adopted – All technical matters will be handled by the Technical Committee and if IYA approval is required quickly, a postal vote shall be taken, in the event of a tie, the motion will be lost.

- 8. René Steimer presented the 2004 Financial Report. The 2004 Auditors Report was accepted.
- 9. The Executive Committee was discharged for year 2004.
- 10. Ammendments.

A compulsory individual Active Membership be established for all sailors participating in Olympic ranking regattas and seeking ISAF Olympic Ranking. The Active Members shall pay an individual annual fee direct to the IYA.

11. Ammendments -

7.2.7 Appoint a Chairman of the WSC.

The members of the WSC shall consist of one officially appointed representative from each NYA

7.5 rule to be deleted

12. Ammendments.

Rules 1.1 & 2.3 The trophies at a championship shall immediately be returned to the IYA Executive Secretary.



Replica trophies shall be engraved and given to the winning boat.

The Trophies and the IYA medals shall be displayed at the Regatta.

Rules 5.4.1 & .2

The terms for Yngling World or continental Championship events, shall be covered by a signed agreement or contract between the NA, Organizing Club and the IYA.

- 14. The Open European Championships will not be held annually .
- 15. & 16. Changes to class rules were decided by the TC and approved by the AGM. See TC minutes.
- 17. The Yngling magazine was applauded.
- 18. The Webmaster was praised for his efforts.
- Austria was discourteous in not tabling their plans to the AGM for the 2005 Open & Women's World Championships.
- 20. The 2006 OWC & WWC will be held in La Rochelle, France in early July.
- 21. The Youth European Cup is proving to popular and the International Youth exchange program had six 11-14 year old Australians sailing in Denmark. Both are to be further developed.
- 22. No report was tabled by the Women's Sailing Committee.

- 23. No report was tabled by Abbott.
- Sunburst Marine have built
 Ynglings from their new moulds.
- 25. No report was tabled by Mader.
- 26. No report was tabled by Børresen.
- 27. DeWolf reported low activity.
- 28. No report was tabled by Nautivela.
- 29. The application from China to build Ynglings was rejected because – no measurers are present, lack of compliancy information and there are too many builders already established competing for too little sails.
- 30. The budget for 2005 year was approved. The Active members fee is included at \$100.
- 31. Henrik Gravesen was elected for one year as President.
- 32. Huub de Haer was elected for one year as Vice President.
- 33. Chris Harper will remain as Secretary for one year.
- 34. René Steimer was elected for two years as Treasurer.
- 35. Fasser & Leuenberger were re-appointed as Auditors.
- 36. Bruce Chafee was appointed as Webmaster for two years.
- 37. Peter Carter AUS, Peter Hinrichsen CAN, Jean-Pierre Marmier SUI and Jose Antonio Anton Olmos ESP are recommended to ISAF to be International Measurers.

- 38. Peter Hinrichsen was elected as Chief Measurer and Chairman of the Technical Committee (TC). Jørgen Ring Northern Europe, Peter Schobels Central Europe, John Ingalls North America, Chris Harper Australia-Asia and the Designer Jan Linge were elected to the TC.
- 39. The President was elected as our representative to the ISAF Classes committee.
- 40. Other Business Mattias Dahlström was appointed as Executive Secretary. The Austrians will be asked to hold a Euro Youth Cup "recognised by the IYA" before the WC2005. Copy of the event will be sent to ISAF - Roel Schellaars is to complimented for his contribution to the TC meeting. Our Past President was unanimously congratulated for unequivocal effort in leading the class for the last 12 years. At an executive committee meeting after closing Ingemar was awarded life membership.

president's message



Dear Sailors and Friends

2004 was in many ways a very interesting year. In Athens the Women competed in the Olympic Regatta in the Yngling for the first time ever. During the ISAF meeting in Copenhagen in November 2004, it was decided that the Yngling should stay on the Olympic program for at least 4 more years.

Let me take this opportunity to congratulate all the Women's Teams on a great performance. Not only have the Women Yngling Teams represented our Class during the Olympic Regatta in Athens in a fine way; they have during the last four years done there upmost to develop the boat and shown the way forward for many men and mixed teams in our Class.

The years up to the Olympics in Athens have not been easy for us. As all Classes on the Olympic Program we had to deal with a lot of new requirements. Today we can state that we are almost there – but only almost. Rules and Measurements will have to be further improved during the next year, but our new Chief Measurer Peter Hinrichsen is doing a tremendous job and I'm sure that this part will also be developed to all sailors satisfaction – including ISAF.

At our Annual General Meeting (AGM) in Stavoren prior to the European Championship 2004 we decided that Mattias Dahlström should be our new Class Secretary (Executive Secretary). Mattias has shown that he is very competent and immediately set his focus on the job, with close contact to Championship Organisers, ISAF and the Executive Committee Members.

In Stavoren the AGM also decided that it was time to change members of the Executive Committee and new President and Vice President were elected. Ingemar Strömblad who has been our President up until 2004 has done at fantastic job for many years and I will take this opportunity again to thank Ingemar for the work he has done for the Class. I would also like to thank Ingemar for representing the IYA at the Annual ISAF Meeting in November 2004 – finalising his work with focus on the Olympic Games and giving the rest of us the opportunity to get to know the organisation.

Thinking back on these things and many more interesting activities during 2004 it has been a special year, but the years to come will be even more interesting, because what happened in 2004 will very much affect the Class during the next four years or more.

Yes, the International Yngling is an Olympic Class – at least for women. But our Class is also – and has always been as social class with strong connections between sailors across borders. It has always been a class with focus on the youth. It has always been a class with many mixed teams participating in our Regattas. Now it is ALSO an Olympic Class.

In Stavoren I accepted the challenge and took the job as President of the IYA. Not an easy job and I don't expect it to be easy to follow Ingemar in this position, but I have a great group of people around me with tremendous knowledge, ideas and interest in working hard for the Class.

I accepted this challenge because I believe that this Class has the necessary connections between sailors around the world. A connection that is necessary if we shall continue to be the best, real, international social class at the same time as being a well organised Olympic Class.

During the next year we will further improve and we will fulfil the requirements set by ISAF and our women sailors as an Olympic Class. But we will work even harder to improve the possibilities of connections between sailors. Communication and possibilities of social connections between sailors, and support of organised Youth programs will be in focus at all times.

High standards at our International regattas are required and we shall do our upmost to ensure that all Yngling sailors will find it attractive to show up, compete and connect.

I'm looking forward to the work with the sailors in this fantastic class and to work with all the enthusiastic people around me for the benefit of the class. The new organisation in the IYA will work as a team looking for your support and involvement, and during this year I hope that we will be able to show that working together is the way forward for our class.

Talk to our National Yngling Association, and let them show you how to get connected to yngling sailors around the world. The International Yngling Class is the class that connects people!

Many of you don't know me, but let this then be the first step in my attempt to make the connection to you:

I attended my first World Championship in Yngling in 1974 and over the years I have sailed an uncountable number of boats.


Since 1975 I have worked as coach for youth in different sports, but since 1990 with special focus on youth sailing in Denmark.

But regardless, whether you have the chance to sail the World Championship or not. Visit Austria, sail on our beautiful lakes and enjoy the Austrian hospitality.



Downunder Delights

In January a healthy contingent of Sydney siders made the long trip south (1000 kms). Looking for a good BBQ and some great sailing they entered the Victorian State Titles and the National Championships, which formed part of the Sail Melbourne ISAF Regatta. It was a raging success and the sailing was very good as well. All the results are on our website. We enjoyed meeting up with Tania and Leonard from Holland who BBQ'd and sailed as well.

The Downunder youth camp in December attracted Marianne SUI, Jacob DEN, Fern Headland VIC (1700Kms) and 15 more legends from Sydney, five Ynglings, a rubber duck, a couple of mother-ships and Australia's answer to Jorgen Ring – Bryan Riddell.

Complete with boom tents, dried food, sunshine, blue water and plenty of fun in sun they sailed in God's Country for a week. They camped in their boats, raced during the day and learnt a lot about seamanship, having a good time and making friends world wide.

This is the Yngling Youth Exchange in action and all the visitors were kept free of charge. It is a great program and we want more youngsters to visit next year. We also trust that the kids from downunder will be made welcome by our Northern Hemisphere friends to participate in similar youth programs and cruises as well. Discussions are under way with Jorgen Ring to take three young Aussie tackers this year on top of the six last year.

Jorgen has led the way and now Bryan, with Alan Reece and John Roxbrough's merry men and Switzerland and Denmark joining in, the International Yngling Class has a really worthwhile youth exchange running.

The Yngling Gold Cup was held in Sydney and was raced by parents, youth and the camp volunteers. The youth campers were given free entry by the Yngling Association. Not to take the glory away from Peter the parent Curran and crew who won the Gold Cup, the real winners were the youth and through them the IYA.

Many of our top Yngling sailors, Hamish Jarrett, Peter Lowndes, Neville Wittey and Jean-Claude Strong competed in this years Sydney to Hobart Blue Water Classic and in other events such as the Global Challenge round the world race.

The Global Challenge is known as the "world's toughest race" as the teams race the wrong way against the wind, in 72 footers. *Samsung* is skippered by Mathew Riddell a Sydney Yngling sailor, and is running 3rd overall after relinquishing his lead on the Sydney leg. Of course when they docked we put on a big BBQ for them.

The *Samsung* team raced Ynglings on Sydney Harbour during their stay and received expert coaching from Yngling World Champion Neville Wittey, and they loved it.

Chris Meehan has reluctantly sold his Yngling and bought a Farr 40. He matched raced with the Prince and Princess of Denmark outside the Sydney Opera House as Matt started the next leg of the Global Challenge to Cape Town. A flotilla of Yngling sailors supported both events on the day.

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

Sailing Yngling in Denmark

In Denmark we have got a fleet of ynglings that amounts to almost 200 boats, of them nearly 125 are active members of the Danish Yngling Association and participate in races. What is special is that only 10 boats are privately owned, all the others are owned by different sailing clubs at the members disposal. Therefore we have always had lots of new crews trying to sail the Yngling for a couple of years. In many clubs the Yngling is used as a stepping stone from dinghys to bigger boats – most of the older generation of sailors in Denmark have for a period of time sailed the Yngling.

The problem is that we always have to provide some kind of coaching to get new sailors to stay in the class and keep being active in races and also at international level. This has been proven by Trine Palludan, winning the 2004 Woman's World Championship and the 2004 Open European Championship, from a young sailor she started learning her skills in the Yngling. It seems that our ideas of hatching sailors to perform top presentations works after all.

It's quite an assignment to develop and find new people to help train the new ones in sailing a race, but it's not impossible. In autumn 2004 there were nearly 20 crews, who, every Sunday participated in practice races at Furesøen north of Copenhagen. At the same time a smaller group met south of Copenhagen and another few got together in Jutland. This work has now resulted in 12 new crews of qualified youngsters to go on the Danish Sailing Association list for a youth national team. In the Danish Yngling Association we do not separate boys and girls, they are all equal and learn from each other, it makes for a great social commitment and solidarity.

The board of the Danish Yngling Association for the last few years has been driven almost only by Jørgen Ring and Henrik Gravesen. But now Henrik has taken a further step and been elected President of the IYA, which now means we need some huge changes on the board. Therefore, one night during the Danish Nationals in Bogense 2004 we had a peptalk and by the Annual General Meeting in November, four new young sailors were selected to join. Now, together with Jørgen Ring they have a lot of work to get started on.

One of our greatest achievements this autumn was the race sailed just out front of the windows of the Hotel Marriott in Copenhagen, where ISAF held their 2004 Annual Meeting.

On a lovely November day we got 20 crews and boats together in Copenhagen Harbour for a short race. We offered members of the ISAF committee a trip around the race course to sell the Yngling and the atmosphere that follows. The President Paul Henderson took up the offer of a break from the meeting room and joined our Woman's World Champion, Trine Palludan for a short sail. Many of the members from around the world went out sailing and were all reminded, the main issue is sailing.

Finally, two Dutch teams were leading the regatta before the last race, but in the last race they decided on a dogfight at the start line and got each other a DNS.

The Youth appreciated the concept very much and on proposal of Denmark, the Euro Cup is now an IYA official recognised event.





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


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In 2005 we will be there again!

The best four sailors of the day were invited to compete and not only the competitors enjoyed this special kind of match race, the "supporters" watching the spectacle also had a lot of fun. A very good idea in 2004 which is planned for 2005 again.

And in 2005 we will be there again!

Despite the long hours of getting there, some German Yngling sailors drove down to Lake Garda to participate in the Riva Cup. This time the lake lived up to its reputation. Strong winds propelled the boats through the water to such an extent that two masts gave in. Sunny weather, wind, waves, fun and great races, what else do you need to enjoy sailing?

So, of course, we will be there again!

It is impossible to make sailing more attractive, but the attraction can be different! This is true for sailing on our small sailing areas, for example the Lohheider See in the northern part or the Sechs-Seen-Platte and in the southern part of Duisburg. Their relaxed atmosphere combined with the personal enthusiasm of the land crew to welcome guest sailors are definitely their strong points. And therefore, in 2005 we will be there again!

Without a doubt, the European Championship in Stavoren/Netherlands represented the highlight in 2004. A tremendously well organised Championship. Our sincerest felicitations to the Yngling Club Holland.

The decision to organise a gold and silver fleet engendered controversial discussions in Germany. And we did not come to a unanimous decision. Personally, I definitively prefer one big fleet. Past experiences show that the fields automatically sort themselves out in the end, in general, without problems. And was it really a good idea to offer as many prizes for the first 15 places in the silver as the first 15 in the gold fleet? So why then fight to create gold fleet? When, finally, results in the second group obtained rewards which better places of the first group did not.

In July 2005, hopefully, this will be different as the open Yngling class will be one single family again. And therefore, we will be there again!

In September 2004, German highways were tested again. The regatta in Duisburg (North Rhine-Westphalia), Lohheider See, took place, followed



one week later, by the regatta in Leopoldshafen near Karlsruhe (Baden-Wuerttemberg). Both regattas gathered approximately 20 Ynglings each and sailors as well as land crews enjoyed their weekends.

Only two weeks later, some German sailors drove to the Starnberger See in Tutzing (Bavaria). If Austrian sailing teams had not supported this regatta we would have to think about our ranking list regatta at the Starnberger See. We need a minimum of 10 boats to start to have a ranking list regatta. For the forthcoming September, we should therefore say, we will be there again!

Although we would never miss the Roermond (Netherlands) regatta, which besides pleasant evenings, always offers interesting and challenging races, this traditional regatta no longer represents the final point of the German sailing season. This is now our Santa Claus Regatta at the Lohheider See (end of November). Nevertheless, regarding Roermond's regatta, one thing is sure, we will be there again!

However, let me add some words about the Santa Claus Regatta!

If we always had the same number of participants as we counted at this regatta we would not have to worry any more. Sailing is by far less important than the social part of the event, getting together and having fun rules first. Obviously others like it as much as we do and we were happy to welcome Belgian, Dutch and Austrian sailors.

Definitively, in 2005 we will be there again!

Let me close by wishing you all the best for 2005, I look forward to seeing you again during the next sailing season!

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ISAF Annual General Meeting in Copenhagen November 2004

Important meeting

This years ISAF meeting was of special interest since there were a lot of selections to be made. The Equipment for the 2008 Olympic games. A new ISAF President and Executive Committee, as Paul Henderson is retiring after many years in ISAF. Also, decisions were made about a different committee structure in the ISAF organization. The IYA was represented by President Henrik Gravesen, Vice President Huub de Haer, Chief Measurer Peter Hinrichsen, President Emeritus Ingemar Strömblad and Executive Secretary Mattias Dahlström.

Yngling Olympic for 2008

The Yngling had applied to be the equipment for the womens keelboat event in 2008. It was thought that the Yngling was suitable equipment for women crews and that it had proved to be a success during the last years. The Yngling was selected without any serious competition.

The Yngling had also applied to be Olympic equipment for the mens keelboat event with a crew of two or three people. The Star was selected but the Yngling had some support. One of the advantages of the Yngling would be to have the same equipment in the womens end mens event which would give advantages for sailors/coaches and regatta organizers. The Yngling also had support among some asian countries which saw the opportunity for average weight crews to be competitive.

The only other changes among the Olympic classes was that a new windsurfing board will be used and that the Laser Radial will be used instead of the Europe.

Open Yngling regattas

Some years ago the IYA made a submission to ISAF to make all Yngling regattas open. The goal of the Yngling class has always been to include as many different people as possible in sailing. Men and women, old and young, family sailors and professionals. This work has been successful and at most Yngling regattas there is a wide range of sailors.

When the Yngling became Olympic many regattas were for women only and many regatta organizers did not realise the potential of the open class. Many of the ISAF committees agreed with the Yngling policy that as many regattas as possible should be open to all kinds of crews. However, it was not considered an ISAF matter to regulate which sailors a regatta organizer can invite. The submission was rejected.

Class rule changes

The Yngling class rules had some necessary changes and clarifications made. Among other things the mast will be measured with a separate measurement form in the future. One change that will affect all Yngling sailors is that the sail number will have to be indicated on the transom. This is to be able to identify the boat when it is not sailing.

Popular Yngling Regatta

Together with the Danish Yngling Association a regatta was organized on the narrow channel waters just outside the hotel where the conference was held. In bright sunshine and light winds over 20 Ynglings had close and exciting racing. Many of the conference delegates watched from the pier and were invited to test an Yngling for some racing. The regatta was popular and well appreciated and showed the strength of the active Yngling class in a very positive way. Many thanks to the Danish YA and others who helped in the organizing.

usa report



Athens!

2004 Yngling sailing in America began with the Olympic Trials Regatta in February. In USA, we choose our sailing team in one regatta. Six teams competed, and the lead was exchanged among a few during a week of very close racing. In the last few days the winds were light... and Carol Cronin was fast... and she won the regatta and the ticket to Athens.

Carol, with crew Liz Filter and Nancy Haberland, had their successes in Athens, starting with a second place in the first race. In the end, Carol and crew finished tenth. Surely their highlights were the two races they won!

Beijing?

Before the 2004 Olympics were even finished, one newcomer began her campaign for the 2008 Games. Laura Schmidt purchased a boat from a 2004 campaigner, brought it and her coach to the North American Championship in August, and stepped into our boat for the first time.

As 2005 begins, other 2008 campaigns are underway. Sally Barkow began her second campaign strongly: she passed Carol Cronin to win the first event of the campaign, the Rolex Miami OCR. Olympic medallists Pease Glaser and J.J. Isler raced, and match-racing ace Liz Baylis joined the fun. German Ulli Schuemann began her second campaign in Miami, and even a Finnish team led by Andrea Borenius raced. The march to Beijing has begun!

USA Regattas

Since the February Trials regatta eliminated Olympic campaigns for Athens, it also eliminated the round of campaign regattas we have had during the last couple of years. We still had good participation at our main fleet regattas, however.

The Great Lakes Championship was held in June at Alpena's Thunder Bay, on Lake Huron. The event was won by local Stephen Fletcher.

The North American Championship returned to Okoboji, Iowa this year. This was a big event for the Iowa fleet, which had not sent sailors to the North Americans for a couple of years, and which has some new teams sailing on Lake Okoboji. The Iowa folks threw an excellent event, with fine race committee work (thank you Bill et al.) and generous hospitality. As mentioned, we had a 2008 Olympic campaigner on course, and a former Olympian (her coach and skipper). In total the fleet was 24 boats. Bruce Chafee defended his title, sailing with Carsten Petersen and Angela Windy. Second place went to John Ingalls, whose crew included his daughter, which leads us to the exciting trend that developed at this year's regatta.





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Young Americans

The big news from the NAs was the progress of young Yngling sailors. The first race of the regatta was won by 16-year-old Joey Jacquemin (with dad and sister crewing). Joey gained places on each leg of the race – a fine display of skill. During the rest of the regatta Joey fought it out with fellow 16-year-old Val Upham. In the end, these two finished fourth and fifth overall! We're excited in the USA to have this young talent growing. So much so that we have created a youth scholarship to help each fleet send a youth team to regattas.

Speaking of youth, we are grateful to Huub and the Dutch for the Euro Cup Youth in 2004. With Huub's generous help, USA was able to send a team (Sebastian Reeve, Sonya Smith, and Katie Smith) to the regatta. The team had a fantastic time, they did well given their inexperience with the Yngling, and they received an excellent introduction to the world of Yngling sailing on the European stage. Thank you to Huub and the Dutch, and let's hope that we can make the EuroCup Youth a regular event.

USA Fleets

In 1988 the North American Championship was raced in Portland, Maine. Since then we have not had much activity in Maine. This might change. The fleet that had been in Newport (some of you raced these boats in the 2001 Worlds) has been moved north to Portland, to be part of a community sailing center there. We do not have a Jørgen Ring to run the program, but nonetheless we hope this can become an active Yngling center again.

We in America invite you to come race with us. Our North American Championship in 2005 will be, for the first time ever, in Canada this year. Come join us!
