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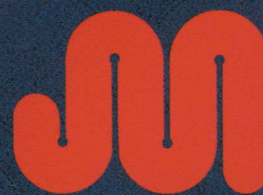

2. The meeting was opened with the news that Jan Linge was in bad health. It was resolved to send him and his wife a letter of support.
3. Henrik Gravesen and Chris Harper were elected Chairman and Minutes Secretary.
4. The published Agenda was approved with adjustments in Items 12, 14, 17 and 19.
5. The minutes of the 2005 AGM were formally adopted.
6. The Chairman's Annual Report was approved although the number of Ynglings built seemed questionable due to ISAF plaques issued versus measurement certificates.

7. The Women's Sailing Committee came up with the following recommendations which were dealt with in the relevant agenda items later;
 - a. The Active Membership Fee of €100 be changed to €300 per skipper due to illness and availability of crew it seemed unfair to the women's teams.
 - b. Credit Card facilities should be introduced.
 - c. Include the WSC minutes in the AGM minutes
 - d. A second representative be included in the Technical Committee.
 - e. The website should be having women's information
 - f. The Executive Secretary job duties be published and costs be included in the Treasurer's Report.
8. The Auditors Report was read and accepted.
The budgeted figure for the Active membership seemed low. The Treasurer was asked to check this. The Yngling Magazine costs being a significant expenditure was questioned. The Secretary advised the meeting that in real terms the cost of the magazine has gone down and we are working on freight reductions. The treasurer was thanked for his work and his report was accepted.
9. The Executive Committee was discharged of it's duties for the year 2005.
10. The Yngling Constitution was amended as follows;

Item 7.2 was approved with the addition of ...appointed Chief Measurer CM and Assistant Chief Measurer ACM (both CM and ACM must be I.M.'s).

Items 7.2.7.1, 7.2.7.2, 7.2.7.2.1, 7.2.7.4, 9.1, 9.1.2, 9.1.3, 9.2, 9.2.1, 9.3 and advance notices of GM to be included in next years agenda.
11. No amendments were proposed for the Championship rules.
12. Class rule changes are approved to be sent to ISAF as follows;

Rule C7.2 8 of 8 and 9 of 9, Rule G3.2 10 of 10 and Rule G1.1 11 of 11

The weight of the low floor and high floor boats and dates for applicable rules are to be resolved by the T.C. by Friday the 7th July.

The introduction to the rules has been changed and the construction manual rules have been included. Mast and sail measurement diagrams have been introduced to make it easier to understand the rules.

13. The International Magazine received favourable comments especially as the cost was reduced. The website was discussed with the EC to implement some improvements. Both Bruce and Chris were thanked for their efforts.

14. The Dutch presentation for the OWC 2007 in Medemblik 20-28th July was tabled.

The WWC 2007 is decided by ISAF and will be held in Cascais POR.

The WEC 2007, decided by the WSC (Womens Sailing Committee) is 20-28th September in Warnemunde, Ostsee, Germany. Applications were from GER, GRE and ITA.

The Danish presentation for OWC 2008 was accepted.

The 2008 WEC verbal application from Spain was accepted, further details to follow. The 2008 WWC Florida, USA presentation from Gary Bodie was tabled and accepted.

15. Builders:

Smidmore Yachting Services was approved to build in Australia and unfortunately Abbott's yard in Canada suffered a devastating fire. The meeting wished Bill and his family all the best for the future and hope things improve for them.

16. Membership fees will remain fixed to last years prices.

17. Henrik Gravesen DEN was elected President for one year:

Huub de Haer NED was elected Vice President for one year.

Rene Steimer was elected Treasurer for two years.

Mattias Dahlstrom SWE was elected Webmaster for two years.

Mattias Dahlstrom SWE was re-appointed as Executive Secretary.

Chris Harper Secretary will serve his 2nd year:

Auditors, Fasser and Leunenberger were re-appointed.

Chief Measurer Peter Hinrichsen was re-elected.

The Technical Committee members are Jorgen Ring, Peter Schoberl, Bruce Ingalls, Jan Linge and Peter Carter.

Chris Harper has stood down after serving 14 years.

The WSC are to announce their new Chairperson.

18. The IYA representatives to the ISAF meetings are to be decided by the EC.

19. General Business the following was resolved:

Credit Card facilities are to be set up by the Treasurer.

The Executive Secretary's job description is to be tabled at the 2007 AGM.

Technical Committee resolutions and ISAF approved changes are to be published quicker.

The Treasurer is to investigate whether the Active Members fee of €100 per person could be changed to €300 per skipper and still cover the costs for the Olympic requirements.

The President proposed that the Budget should include support for the International Youth Exchange. A group of NYA's are to meet to advise on costs.

20. The date for the next meeting is Friday the 20th July 2007 in Medemblik.

PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE 07

Looking back or looking forward. Mostly my focus has been on progress and improvements, but I have to admit that we have not succeeded – YET.

It would not be fair to blame anyone but myself; however it is clear that we simply have to do better – and we will.

The IYA have for years proved itself as a well functioned organisation managing the Class and organising International regattas. Our Class has developed a strong culture across the world where social contact between sailors combined with a very high racing standard have always been key factors.

We are now facing the end of our second period as an Olympic Class and it's time to act on the lessons learned. It's time to look back and learn and it's time to make changes in order to solve the problems we have identified. We will be ready for 2007. We will be ready for 2008 and we will be ready for four more years!

- More ready than anyone else!

Unfortunately we needed to improve our Class Rules further. Our Communication is too poor and our organisation is not efficient enough to handle the problems we are facing, with the tempo needed.

The Yngling Class Rules have been a special project for years, not only for the Class Organisation and our Technical Committee, but also for ISAF. Being an Olympic Class our Class Rules have been exploited and our Measurers tested to such an extent that major clarifications had to be made to our Class Rules, and our Measurers have found a new meaning for the word "Overtime".

Action has been taken and we are working closely together with ISAF to finalise these changes to our Class Rules. However, during the work ISAF found that some problems were not only related to the Yngling Class, but should be considered on a broader term. Unfortunately this had the impact that finalising this project took way too long as seen from the sailors and manufacturers point of view.

In addition, this project has proven to me that our organisation has to be changed. We need an organisation that is tuned to work fast and efficiently and take the necessary decisions in order to give our sailors and

manufacturers the support they expect and ISAF the qualified partnership needed.

We shall support our National Organisations with better communication and facilitate better coordination. We shall improve our measurement program at regattas and we shall focus further on the youth program within our Class.

"We shall" is not just empty words in a Magazine. It is identified areas where we know we can improve and now we also know how to do it.

In order to ensure continuity in the Class we have appointed Roel Schellaars as Assistant Chief Measurer and asked ISAF to take this into consideration when appointing Measures to the Olympic Regattas. Furthermore, three International Measurers are participating in the IM-Conference in 2007 and both Peter Hinrichsen and Roel Schellaars may be in position as IM's at the Olympic Regattas.

A new improved web-site has been developed by Mattias and it will be further improved during 2007.

Our focus on the youth during the past years has resulted in a European Championship, now well established as an annual event and we will keep supporting the Youth Exchange Program that is so well handled at national levels.

Our contact to ISAF and our working procedure with ISAF have been improved in order to ensure better understanding of the sailors' needs and efficiently improve the communication and decision making process. In 2007 we will do whatever it takes to improve these areas even further.

A new organisation will be presented in spring 2007. We have taken the first initiative to use "in house certification" which can improve our equipment standard and make measurement much more efficient during regattas and a new concept for a Measurement Program has been put forward to our Chief Measurer.

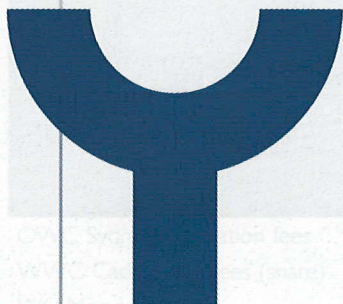
It is my hope that these initiatives will be welcomed by our sailors and the class manufacturers and approved at our Annual General Meeting in 2007.

It may have taken nearly eight years to improve our organisation in order to prove that the Yngling and the Class Organisation is the right choice for 2012 Olympics, but we have worked constructively and focused in order to apply to the demands and expectations. And we will be ready.

I know that a lot of Sailors, Coaches, Sail Makers etc. have been frustrated during the long period waiting for conclusions on the Class Rules. Can I just assure everyone that we are doing all we can within the power given us, to end this project.

In the end the scope is Sailing, but don't forget that the thing that drives most of us is the connection between people across the world.

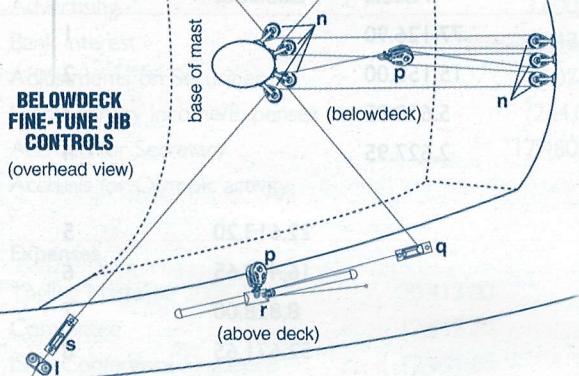
THE INTERNATIONAL YNGLING

In 2008 the Yngling will once again be the Women's keelboat for the Olympics in Beijing. Designed by Jan Linge in 1967 as the little sister to the Soling, this nimble three-person racer features a well-balanced rig, responsive helm, and reacts quickly to small trim and crew weight adjustments. With an optimal crew weight between 400-500 lbs, the Yngling is a great boat for junior and averaged-sized sailors. Over 4,000 boats are sailing worldwide.

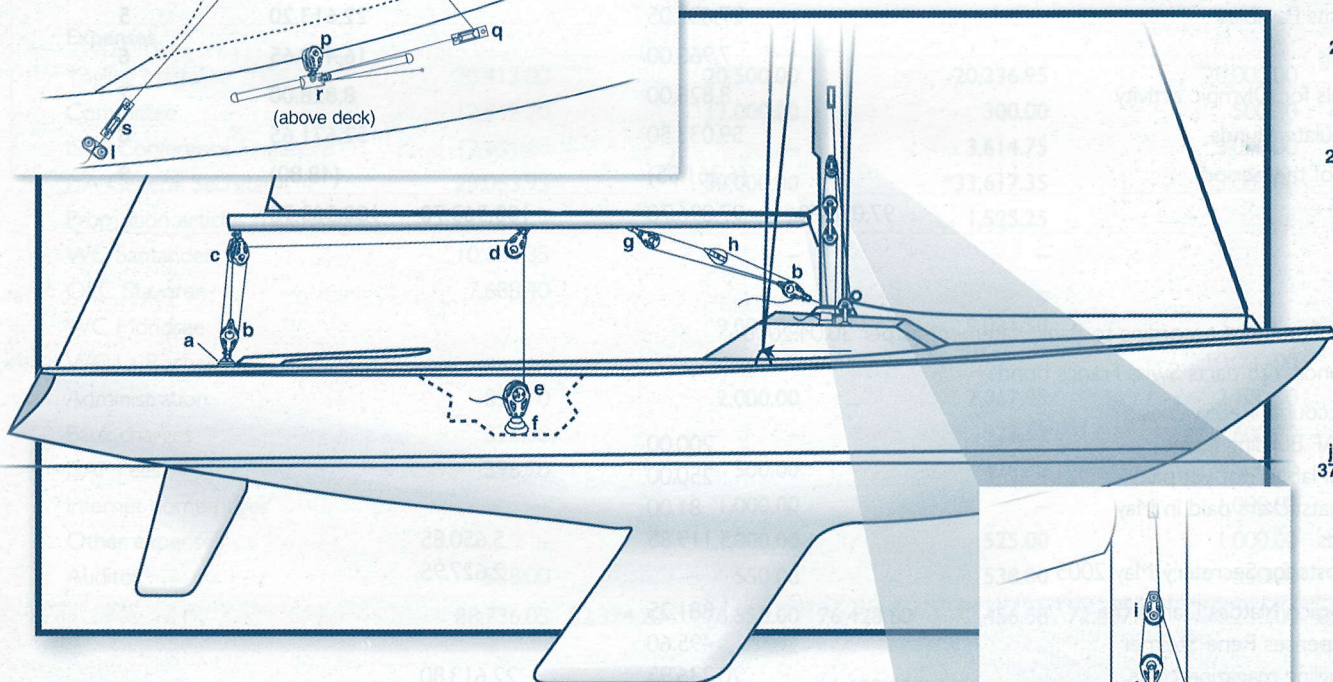

BELOWDECK FINE-TUNE JIB CONTROLS (overhead view)

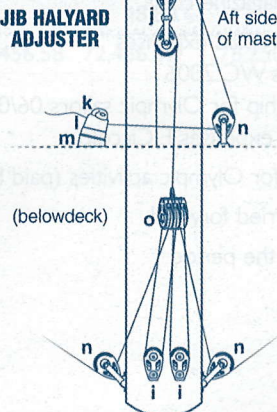


BELOWDECK FINE-TUNE JIB CONTROLS

This 4:1 double-ended system allows crew to simultaneously control the movement of both traveler cars from the weather rail. Cars stay in the same position helping to maintain jib trim from tack to tack. The belowdeck feature keeps decks clean.

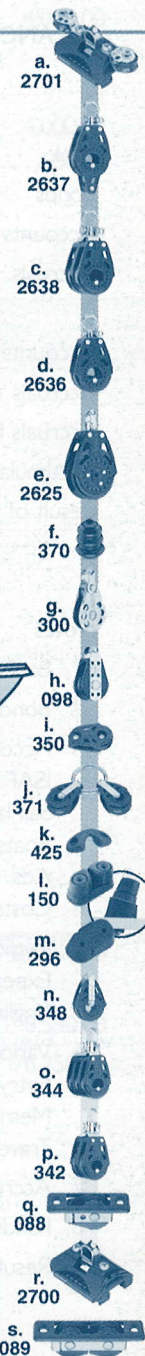


JIB HALYARD ADJUSTER

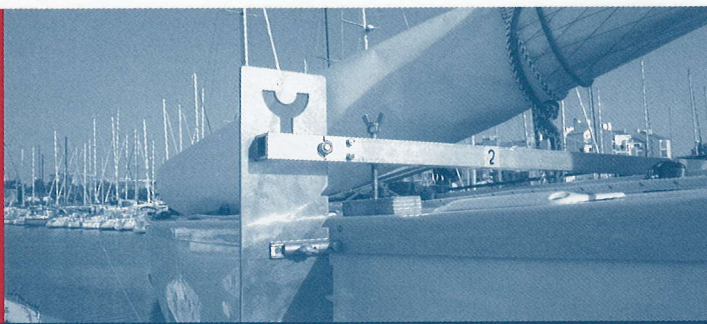

The Yngling sailing event will be staged off the Baltic seaside resort of Warnemünde.

Warnemünde is predestined to stage sailing events. As early as 1886 the first regattas took place off the coast and since 1926 national and international regattas (Warnemünder Woche) have been staged here. One can get to the open sea a few hundred meters from the harbour. A straight stretch of the coast, long waves, little current and fantastic wind conditions – these are the features of fantastic regatta sailing off Warnemünde.

The sailing centre Warnemünde is situated about 230 kilometres north of Berlin and 10 kilometres from the Hanseatic town of Rostock.

Rostock can be reached from airports in Hamburg or Berlin-Tegel or by ferry from Scandinavia. From Berlin to Rostock, you can go by motorway A19/A24 and from Hamburg motorway A20 and then by city-highway E55 to Warnemünde.

Rostock, the largest town of the federal state of Mecklenburg-Vorpommern, is a universal port, which handles 20 Mill. tons of goods annually. The port is situated at the mouth of the river Warnow. The harbour area extends from Warnemünde right into the heart of the city.

Science and advanced technology, shipbuilding, harbour activity and of course tourism are still flourishing in the Hanseatic town of Rostock and its seaside resort Warnemünde. Rostock harbour is an ideal gateway to the German capital Berlin and a valuable centre for trade with Scandinavia and Eastern Europe.

Warnemünde, a former fishing village, has acquired a name as one of Germany's leading seaside resorts. Its broad, sandy beaches, lofty coastal woodlands and cliffs, neat fishermen's cottages and cosy pubs are still among its chief attractions.

The "Warnemünder Segel-Club" is the Organisation 'Committee in co-operation with the "Berliner Yacht-Club" and the German Yngling Association, and we are looking forward to seeing you in Warnemünde.

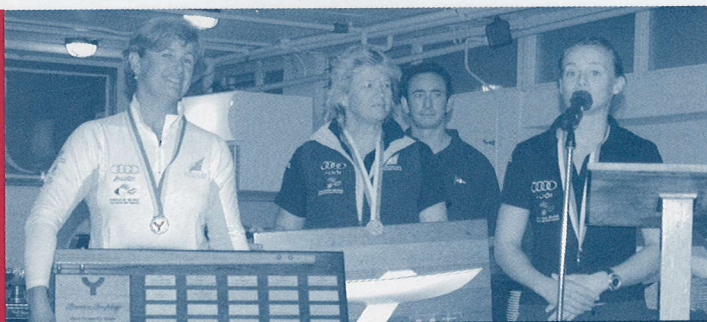

So, see you all at Lake Garda on the 2nd to 5th of May!

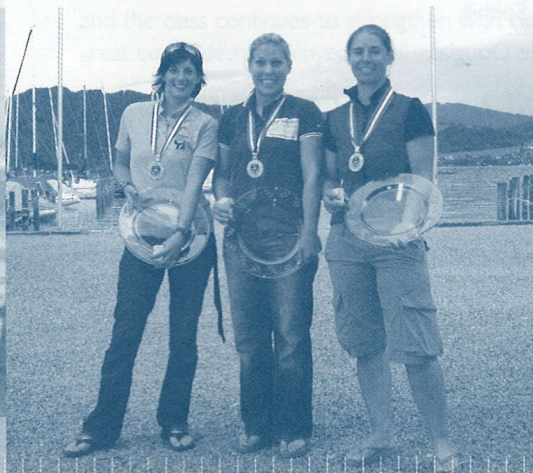

Volvo Euro Cup 21-23 July 2006

From 21-23 July 2006 the Volvo Euro Cup was sailed in Medemblik the Netherlands. This is the second edition of this new event and was an initiative of Yngling Club Holland and the National Foundation Youth Sailing. In this Volvo Eurocup, 155 sailors from 15 countries competed in three youth classes, Yngling, Splash and Flash. In relatively light winds the committee managed to run six successful races in tropical conditions. One of the goals of the foundation is to promote sailing and to give young talent a chance to compete against top sailors.

Open and Womens European Championship

Dutch youth talent got the opportunity to compete against the elite in the Womens fleet of the Yngling class. Most of the competitors of the European Championship used this as a warm up race for the big event. This international event started on Tuesday 25 July and ended Saturday 29 July with two races per day.

In the Volvo Euro Cup, leading up to the Europeans, men were also allowed to compete in the Yngling fleet. In total there were 38 competitors from 15 countries. The girls from the Ukraine won, Ruslana Taran came out as the winner after six races. The first Dutch team was an all male one with helmsman Hidde-Jan Haven. Haven from Sneek also was 5th at the Open World Championship in the Yngling.

The first Dutch women's team in the overall ranking was a pleasant surprise. Youth talent team of Renee Groeneveld beat her more experienced rivals in the class by finishing ninth. Best Dutch team of the Olympic selection was the team of Janneke Hin, Marije Faber and Floortje Hendriksen in twelfth position.

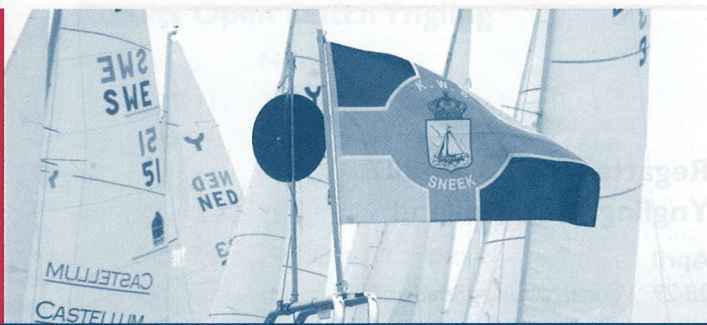

Volvo Womens Yngling European Championship 2006

Medemblik Netherlands – After nine races Monica Azon from Spain can call herself World and European Champion 2006. The Azon sisters who sail with Graciela Pisonero won the series convincingly with sixteen points difference. "We are very happy with this result. In these conditions we are really confident and we have the perfect set up. We took the right decision on the equipment to use and we sailed well. Sometimes it is like Formula One with all the equipment," said Azon.

Second place went to the Dutch the team of Mandy Mulder, Brecht van der Werf and Petronella de Jong. Mulder (18)

is quite new to the Yngling game. She joined the Dutch Federation's team last year. In this event she was sailing with the experienced De Jong, who also participated in the Yngling in Athens with Van der Werf, Werf has been sailing the Yngling for one and a half years now. Mulder is still not sure what happened afterwards. "It feels a bit unreal. I am very content with this. We sailed well during the Worlds but made two big mistakes and did not end up on the podium. Now we have got our revenge."

The remarkable fact is that all nine sailors of the top three Dutch boats work together as one team. Positions, teams and boats are swapped around for every event under the directive of coach Maurice Paardenkooper, who also coached Team ABNAMRO Two in the Volvo Ocean Race. The objective of this Dutch Yngling Project is to create a group of strong sailors instead of focusing all efforts on one team of three girls alone. Eventually the best combination of three athletes will be chosen to represent the Netherlands in Beijing, if that situation occurs.

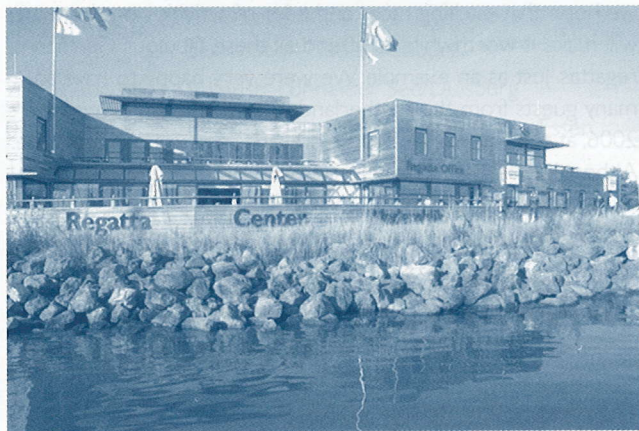
Third place went to the team of Ulrika Schuemann (GER). The German team came second during the recent World Championships in La Rochelle and wanted revenge on the Spanish. Schuemann sailed with an interim crew from the USA, Icyda Lee. She was happy considering the fact that she was sailing with a new crew, but not satisfied with her performance. "Winning is about making the least mistakes. We made too many. I will have to get my revenge in China in the pre-pre Olympics this year."

GERMAN REPORT

Ulrike Schuemann and her crew of GER 261, Runa Kappen and Ute Hoeptner, became Vice-World Champions – a really outstanding success. Once again: Congratulations from the Deutsche Klassenvereinigung.

ISAF ANNUAL CONFERENCE

06



The ISAF Annual Conference this year was held in a snowy Helsinki. 10 days of meetings covering all kinds of topics in the Sailing World. The International Yngling Association was represented by Henrik Gravesen, Peter Hinrichsen and Mattias Dahlstrom.

ISAF World Series for Olympic Classes

It has been discussed for some years to create a Sailing World Series or World Cup like in many other sports. The obvious reason is to make it simpler and more understandable. A certain number of regattas and a winner every year. Today the ranking and grading systems sometimes reflect history rather than what has happened at the latest regattas.

Another, maybe even more important reason is to make it possible for the sailors to make a living out of sailing Olympic Classes. Today, almost every Olympic Campaigner is heavily dependant of the support of their National Authorities and often spend their own funds to be able to sail competitively.

Having an easy-to-understand, media-friendly, nicely-packaged tour would make it easier for both ISAF and sailors to find commercial partners that could provide world wide transportation solutions and make prize money possible.

The ISAF Council approved this project and will have it ready for launch in 2008. The Class World Championship, Miami OCR, Sail Melbourne, Princess Sofia Trophy, Hyeres Regatta, Holland Regatta and Kiel Week should initially be part of the Series. The World Championship and any other 4 events should be included in the scoring with the restriction that only three events from the same continent (Europe) can be included. Once the Series is established there will be a possibility to make a yearly World Cup Final where the top 10 in every class would go head to head. Of course there are many details still to be decided, and the time to influence them is now.

Yngling Class Rule Changes

As many of you have noticed there were a lot of discussions in 2006 about the Yngling jib. When the problem was brought forward to ISAF, they concluded that this was not only an Yngling problem, but a more general one with some measurement definitions that should be solved by ISAF.

It is my hope that this will have found a good solution by the time this text is printed.

Some 15 years ago, when the self-bailing high floor was introduced, there was a discussion on where to store the mandatory anchor. It was then decided to allow to have it stored below the high floor. ISAF have now overruled this class rule for security reasons, so the anchor will have to be stored in the cockpit area in the future.

One of the submissions raised the problems with International Classes sailing without an ISAF plaque at World Championships because their boat was built before the class status was International. This affects our class since thousands of Ynglings were built before 1979, when the Yngling became International. Council decided that any boat built after 1990 shall have an ISAF plaque when racing in the World Championship. This should not be a problem for any Yngling, but if your boat was built after 1990 and is for some reason missing the ISAF plaque, please contact the IYA and we will help you get a replacement plaque.

Medal Race Regatta Format

The Medal Race Format has now been used for a year and some evaluation was made. There were some differences in handling the points given on letter scores and on how to count the number of yellow flags. This was debated and of course the conclusion was that there should be a standard on this for all regattas using the format.

Olympic Classes for 2012

No decisions were made on this subject. In 2007 it will be decided which events will be sailed – i.e. women's keelboat and in 2008 it will be decided what equipment (class) will be used.

A big change is that for the Olympics 2012 sailing will only have 10 events compared with the 11 for 2008. This was a decision of the IOC. The 2007 ISAF conference will contain a lot of discussions on which event will disappear and also if match racing should be included or not in the Olympics.

Being an appreciated International three person keelboat suitable for women crews with sailors from all six continents, the Yngling stands strong for future Olympics regardless of the event.

SWISS REPORT

The Swiss Yngling people had a successful 2006 season with many highlights. The year started well with prize giving parties, bowling parties with good food and drinks, all organised by different fleets, followed by courses with perfect knowledge of the rules, boat tuning etc. We practiced fleet and match racing with "virtual skipper", up to 10 computers were linked together. The results were hot races and a lot of analysis to get the rule pushers back on the right track.

The races in the first half of the season were all well attended. Sometimes the sun took a break but wind was always there. Two teams travelled to La Rochelle for the Worlds, SUI 78 Ilg/Ilg/Eggimann and SUI 398 Haag/Wider/Cataldi.

After the summer break, one of the highlights was the "Semaine du Soir" on Lake of Geneva. But Lake of Zürich was the centre of gravity, mainly for regattas and training for the Swiss Yngling Championship which took place at Zürich from September 7 to 10. 28 Crews enjoyed excellent food, drink and hospitality at the Zürich Sailing Club. Sometimes Aelus did meet us and helped us to finish 5 races.

Like the year before, Rudi Mayr/Georg Tattwich took the gold medal back home to Austria!

Second were the Dutch, Don van Arem and third was the first Swiss boat, SUI 203 Christoph Kohlschütter and his crew.

The racing season was not over yet, 2 more regattas were held on Lake of Thun and Lake of Zürich, all with good participation and even better after race parties.

The year ended with the traditional "Raclette" party, organised by the fleet of Hallwil. Most of the remaining stock of Swiss cheese was melted and ended up as Raclette to feed a lot of hungry Yngling sailors.

Next year's program will be as attractive as the last one, a special mention for the Swiss Yngling Championship on Lake of Hallwil from September 27 to 30. You can get all the info on www.yngling.ch

USA Takes the Gold!

The United States won its first Open Yngling World Championship in 2006!

Well... is there anything more to say? OK, if you insist...

John Ingalls was, it seems, not completely satisfied with being the first American to mount the awards podium last year with a bronze. He came back this year, to La Rochelle France, with a younger crew, a brand-new boat (built by his company, DeWolf Boats, of course), and the experience of playing at the top of the heap. The result is one of which all of us Yngling sailors in America are enormously proud: John's name on the Yngling trophy!

John, with crew Jamey Randall and Michael Komar, turned in a very solid regatta performance. It was not stunning; that label belongs to others who started aggressively and led the regatta at times... only to be burned by that same flame. John and crew just sailed very well all the time, and in the end they were the only one standing.

Well, almost. At the end it looked as though Dane, Bo Reker Andersen was headed for gold, with John securing silver and Dutchman Christian Roukema in bronze-land. Suddenly – another Dutch boat seem to upset John enough to allow countryman Christian to take silver, and put John in bronze (that was just a funny Dutch coincidence, right guys?). It all happened at the end of the last race: As John rounded the last windward mark ahead of Christian (as needed to take silver), another Dutch boat still on the beat crossed paths

with John, and John fouled him. John's ensuing 720 helped Christian to pass him and put John back to bronze. No thank you, said John: the aggressive match-racer in him threw off the gloves, and he attacked Christian from behind and passed him. Silver regained, thought John! Settle for bronze, thought Christian. Close enough (behind John in the race but ahead in the regatta) for gold, thought Bo! The race committee, however, knew better: Bo was OCS, and dropped to bronze; Christian was OCS, and dropped off the podium; Dutchman Tom Ote was clean, and moved to silver; and John, having fought to silver found himself in gold instead! Quel drame, disaient les français!

Canadian Steals North American Trophy from Americans

You might know Nigel. Or you might have heard him, but not seen him ("is he that guy with the brass voice and straw hat?"). He can be rather crafty, after all. Take, for example, his determined theft of the North American Yngling title: Firstly, he masquerades as coach of a women's team. I mean, sure, he coached – and coached well – but he also learned. Learned how to sail this boat, and sail it well.

It all started in Iowa, a state in USA known more for its corn-fields and presidential primary elections than sailing. But lo and behold, there appeared Nigel in 2004 in Laura Schmidt's new boat with Nigel as coach but skipper for that event. His 470 Olympics experience showed strongly, and but for an ill-timed OCS and other bad luck Nigel just might have left that lake with the title.



Nigel, however, took the long view. Back he came in 2005 in Toronto. Same boat, same Laura crewing (and crewing even better), but better Nigel. Must have been his home country. He was either leading or tied for the lead during most of the regatta. He was tough! But he was beaten back again.

Third time's a charm for Nigel. And how! None of the drama, the back-and-forth, the close duels, the dock-side trash-talk of years one and two. The guy aced the first race and never looked back. All firsts and seconds; make that mostly firsts and a few seconds. Mission accomplished. Title taken. North American Championship.

My response? Went out and bought me my own darned cowboy hat. Maybe that's the secret?!
