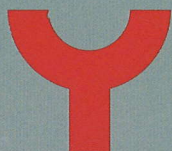

PresidentsMessage



Two periods as an Olympic Class has given the International Yngling Class a solid foundation for a new future as a strong international Class, with focus on the fun part of sailing. The Yngling Class is all about friendship across the world, sportsmanship and great sailing. No other boat is more suitable to support these values. No other Class has a better foundation to support these values.

Yes, we aimed for a new period as part of the Olympic Circus, in faith that the people entrusted to decide the evolution on sailing would take the right decisions – at the right time.

Olympic sailing should be the elite of sailing and while having focused on the original basis for the Olympic Games giving all Nations the opportunity to participate. The decision regarding the Olympics must also show the willingness to constantly stay focused on the evolution of our sport.

It was interesting for all, that the Yngling was chosen as the equipment for the Women's Keelboat 9 years ago. However, there was in fact no other modern equipment available well established around the world and with a sufficiently well organised international Class organisation.

The numbers of participants and events at the Olympic Games are limited. The sport of Sailing includes Match Racing. Point well taken, if we can't have Match Racing for men at the Olympics – send the women... at any cost.

The decision has been taken and the International Yngling Class respectfully recognises the decision – how unfortunate for the sport it may be. In fact there is absolutely nothing wrong in selecting new events and more modern equipment for the Olympics – as long as this is done with full recognition of the basis of the Olympic Games, within the basic principles for such selections, in respect of the sport of sailing worldwide including the sailors that make sailing a sport.

Since the decision was taken by the ISAF Council last November, a number of substantial issues have arisen out of normal discussions among women and Member National Authorities interested in participating in Women's Olympic competition. This has naturally included members of the Yngling Class. Questions have been raised whether the selection of equipment was done within the basic principles and rules. The equipment selected has no established International Class and in fact not even available at the time it was needed for regattas.

More disappointing is the fact that this equipment was selected without knowing the format and the qualification system to be used for this new event.

Taking into account the international crises it must be frustrating for many that these decisions will increase the cost significantly for participating in the trials for the Olympic Women's Match Racing in 2012.

This may seem to be a frustrated speech from a defeated Class Organisation, but maybe this is the time for a lot of high positioned people to stop for a second and think again.

The Yngling is a boat from 1967, not within the scope of modern equipment for the Olympic Games. Sailing Yngling as mentioned in the beginning is the perfect solution for many sailors around the world and it will be so beyond several Olympics to come. However, facing the situation that no modern equipment suitable for 3 women, well established and tested is available, it could seem wiser to rethink the whole concept of Match Racing. Select equipment suitable and available – don't select equipment – or wait until the sport is ready before introducing a new event.

It just seems like a bad story about desperate implementation of new software before it has been tested. One can't help thinking about how personal or commercial interests can be like a virus to a good idea. Now – The International Yngling Class has been there. We have had great benefits from that period and we now have a solid foundation to continue and develop as a strong International Class.

Our Class rules have been strengthened, we have a whole fleet of newer boats available and our organisation has collected valuable knowledge throughout these past 9 years.

We will use this wisely and benefit from the years past. The "women only concept" has been introduced to our Class and the concept will continue as part of our International Championships. The *Linge Cup* will be awarded to the best all women's team complying with the all women's rules at our Yngling Open World Championship in 2009.

The first Yngling Keelboat was built in 1968. The Yngling obtained International status in May 1979 and Olympic status in November 2000.

- IYA shall manage the affairs of the Class.
- IYA shall encourage national and international competition in the Class.

The meeting was opened at 10:30. Jørgen Ring was thanked for providing the meeting facilities.

Henrik Gravesen and Chris Harper were elected Chairman and Minutes Secretary.

The published Agenda was approved with adjustments for current issues.

Ukraine is invited to be recognised as a new National Yngling Association (NYA).

The minutes of the 2007 AGM published on the Web site and in the Yngling Magazine were formally adopted.

The Chairman's Annual Report was approved.

The Women's Sailing Committee:

- b. No minutes were recorded.

The Auditors Report by Fasser and Leunberger was read and accepted.

The Treasurer was thanked for his work and his report was accepted.

The meeting would like the Treasurer to look at doing the accounts in Euro's.

The Executive Committee was discharged of its duties for the year 2006.

No amendments to the constitution were put forward.

Amendments to the Championship Rules.

The first race of every Open World Championship be named the Jan Herman Linge Memorial Race. This is to honour the late Jan Herman Linge. The Yngling Championship rules were changed to introduce the Jan Herman Linge Race and the Jan Herman Linge Memorial Trophy will be awarded to the winning team to keep his memory alive. This perpetual trophy will be the property of the IYA and awarded each year.

The President reported that the EC would like the meeting to discuss the Helmsman definition, the fees, contact information on the website and wind and time limits.

1. The team consists of the crew and it is up to the team to decide who does what at what time in the boat during the race.
2. The skipper of the boat is the Helmsperson and that person has to steer the boat whilst racing.

The meeting will ask the NYA's to change Rule 8.4 to be in accordance with RRS definition of crewing by postal vote. The nationalities of the crew on the boat will be decided by the NYA's.

3. Privacy concerns for the Website will be respected as requested.
 4. The meeting will have a postal vote on the number of races.
- The meeting will have a postal vote to allow a nominated representative to advise the race committee as to safety of the sailors in event.

No amendments of the Class Rules were put forward in the allocated time.

The 2008 Yngling Magazine was applauded. The Vice President will co-ordinate the advertising with the Honorary Secretary.

All in all we are confident that Kalmar and Sweden will meet your highest demands for a perfect setting of the World Championship 2009.

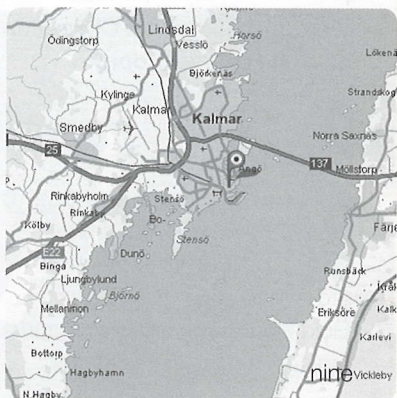
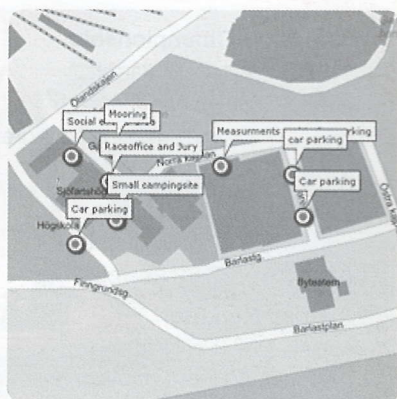
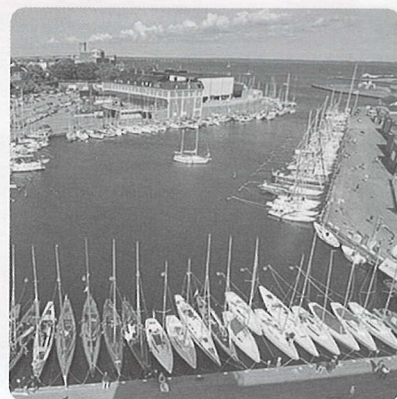
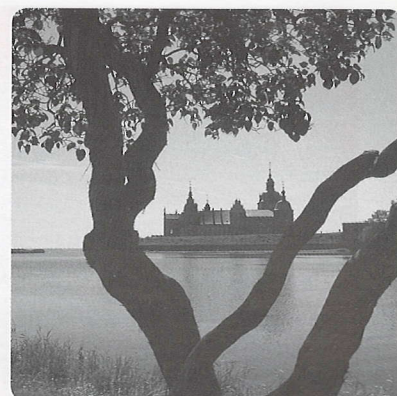
The organiser is the Sailing Club Kaparen, the active sailing race club of Kalmar.

Yngling racing for the current season has embraced all levels from the complete beginner to Olympic standard and created some very exciting and also fun racing. The season started with the Australia Day regatta and concluded with the Christmas Regatta and the Gold Cup.

The Audi Sydney Harbour Regatta was held in March with over 300 boats competing on the harbour.

Australia sent two teams compete at the European Youth Championships and three teams to the open worlds. With mixed results fun was had by all. At the International AGM Chris Harper was given life membership of the class for his many years of service to the International Yngling Association.

The Parramatta River Regatta on the October long weekend was another great success. Racing on the unfamiliar waters of the river and after five races with many tricky wind shifts the regatta concluded with a fantastic dinner.

Six boats contested the Auspac Regatta (15-16 November 2008). This regatta is intended to encourage women to move into racing. 20 women from 6 different sailing clubs took part in this year's AUSAAC Regatta. The objective of the regatta for the last three years has been to promote women's sailing. The event proved very successful with a half day of class room theory was followed by on the water training in some very testing conditions. Sunday entailed 6 short course races with spinnakers, ably conducted in the spirit of fun and learning.

The 5th Youth Cruise was held just prior to Christmas. With four visitors from Denmark the cruise had a real international feel. This year the cruise again took a tour of Sydney Harbour, including a tour of Cockatoo Island, a trip to Manly, camping up the Parramatta River the cruise was again a great success. Hope to see international sailors again for the coming year.

AIYA Nationals and SIRS

This year the AIYA nationals were held in conjunction with the Sydney International Regatta (SIRs), 6-9 December. The harbour was alive with Olympic and other select classes. Hundreds of boats competed on four separate course areas, with a morning and afternoon start time on each. On Saturday the 6th, the first Yngling heat was much delayed as the Race Committee valiantly tried to give the morning racers a full program. Even in the afternoon, the breeze varied greatly from light to fairly strong with some rather large directional shifts. Hamish Jarrett, AUS 8 read the breeze the best, sailing the pressure and shifts to great advantage to make heat one theirs, closely followed by the Reece family sailing AUS 43. A great left hand flier gave Ellis Todres, AUS 40 third place. Heat two had a repeat in positions for the top two with Karyn Gojnich and family on AUS 57 in third position. The racing was extremely tight with very little difference in performance, especially between the top five boats – and not much between the whole fleet. Heat three saw AUS 45 sail to victory with what was to become an annoyingly consistent 1st, 2nd 3rd of AUS 8, AUS43 and AUS 45. As consolation to the rest of us, the racing was still extremely close and very enjoyable.

Day two saw us with the 10am start time allocation and with the morning sailing came the lighter breeze. The advantage swung to AUS 57 winning both heats 4 and 5 but smart consistent sailing saw AUS 8 finish with two seconds. It was great to see Christine Ingate return to Yngling sailing with Mel Nathan and Candace Christensen on AUS 25 – 3rd in heat five.

On the last day of our championships the breeze was back – a good Sydney Harbour nor'easter with lots of grey clouds. The racing remained extremely close, which was a testament to the fleet's great boat handling skills in the tricky gusty winds and harbour waves. The last day honours though went to Jordan, Alan and Michael Reece with 1, 2, and 1 to give them 2nd overall. The title and deserved victory went to Hamish Jarrett, Lorna Jackson and Alana Bracken on AUS 8. Third place went to AUS 45 Gary Wogas, Sandy Fesq and Cameron Sloey.

Highlights of 2008? No question – the Olympic Games. After really thrilling qualifying contests Ulrike Schumann and her team of Julia Bleck and Ute Höpfner could start on their way to China. With a strong will to let their medal dreams become reality. Unfortunately these three top-sailors had to be content with fourth place – but they take it with equanimity and sporting spirit. In her report for the German Yngling association Ulli Schumann outlines their experiences like this:

“Gaining a medal was within our grasp. But in the end we have to be content with 4th place, the so called, wooden medal. Nevertheless, the XXIX Olympic Games will last as an unforgettable event for us. There is more to it than taking part – but taking part is very, very much, and, in any case, a real dream.”

We will keep our fingers crossed – and pay our respect to Ulli and her team for their success and their effort.

Not so far East, a little bit less far North was the trip for those sailors who decided to join the World Championship 2009 in Denmark's Copenhagen. Most German Yngling sailors are experts on inland waters –therefore sailing on the Baltic sea was a welcomed variety and challenge for them. A real “royal” experience, that's the unanimous summary. “Royal” as the name of the Copenhagen Sailing Club has promised. Sincere compliments to the Danish organisers.

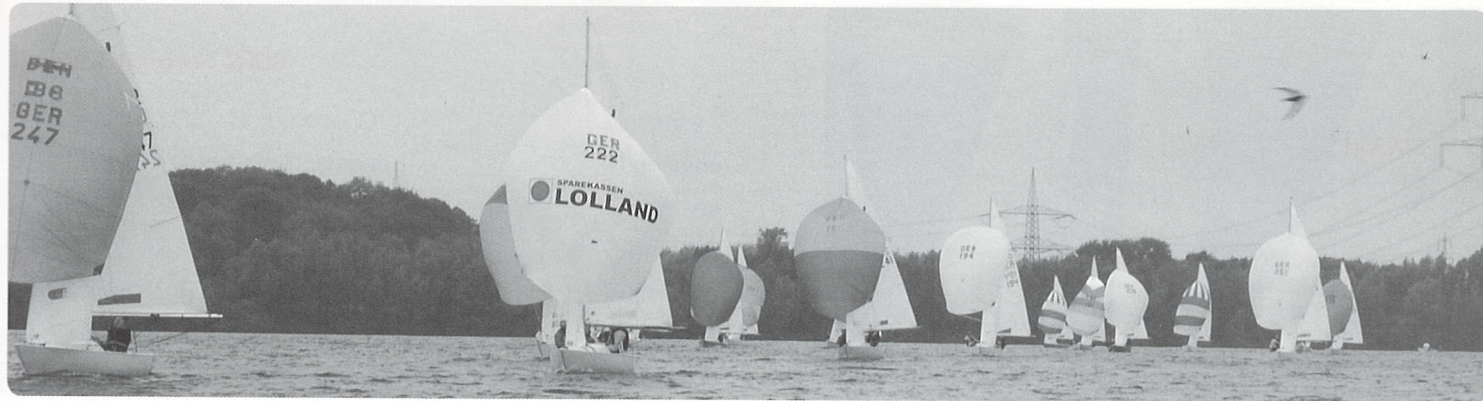
In addition, they created an unexpected learning experience for the sailors – with their GPS tracks. Those tracks not only allowed the people who stayed at home to follow the proceedings on the water in detail, but offered the sailors a chance to put tactics and manoeuvres to the test again, when they logged into the world championship's website back at home. Sometimes these checks give the good feeling that you are nearly as fast and tricky as the best – but sometimes you realise that you need some more hours of training on the boat to join the top flight.

Congratulations to Thorsten Schutt who, together with Bea Marx and Kai Morwinski, laid on the best result of the World Championship for the German association by achieving one 9th place and finishing the races in 19th place.

2008 was also a year of taking on new sailing areas. For the first time, some of us started at the “Euregio Regatta”, a regatta that is staged on Dutch, Belgian and German waters in the “Euregio” border region between these three European states. Beyond that, especially the sailors from Western Germany created a steady place in their regatta schedules for “Sailing week” on the Essener Baldeneysee – including thrilling and very popular match races. Like the Wassersportverein Rheinkamp-Duisburg, the regatta organisers in Essen focused on a “Lady's Cup” to motivate the Yngling helmswomen.

The German Yngling Association congratulates three sailing clubs with very active Yngling sailors on their jubilees; Weseler Segelclub for 40 years existence (we congratulated them at the season opening at the Easter regatta when 2008 started with sailing in snow); being active for 35 years was the reason to congratulate the WSVRh in the summer; and in autumn the Segelkameradschaft Leopoldshafen received warm hearted congratulations, they also look back on 40 years sailing in the South West of Germany.

Looking back, from 2007 we are happy to report a smooth upward trend. This has continued during 2008. Sad to say that six owners have resigned their membership in the association, but at the same time we are happy to welcome



four new members. Not only as owners, but as active sailors, too. In addition, there are 34 boats listed on the German ranking – a number that is absolutely satisfying. As satisfying as saying “Hello” to our guests from abroad. We are happy not only to see our abbreviation “GER” on the sailing boats starting in the regattas... but to see NED, BEL or DEN, too. Many thanks for joining us – and, see you in 2009.

By the way, to see the UK abbreviation “GBR” instead of “GER” is not extraordinary any more in Germany, since boats and various brand new sails sold by the UK gold medal winners have found their way to Germany :-)

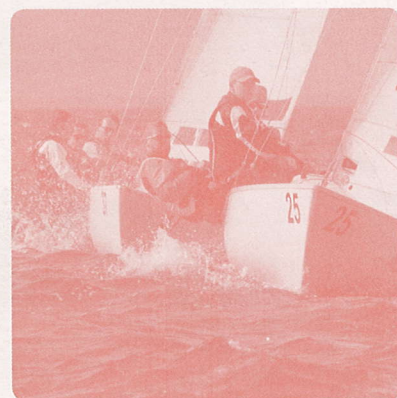

YnglingMeasurers Report2008

2008 was an eventful year for the Yngling class beginning with the Women's World Championships in Miami, which was the final qualifier for the Olympics, the Open and Youths Championships in Skovshoved and the Beijing Olympics. Unfortunately the ISAF decisions in November did not go in our favour and we now have new challenges as a vibrant International class. Fortunately this means that the class will have a far greater control of its destiny, and specifically the class rules. With this in mind there have been no changes to the class rules for 2009, those suggestions which arose will be discussed and presented to the Executive Committee in Kalmar this summer.

We were fortunate to have excellent measurement facilities in both Miami and Skovshoved where I was ably assisted by Peter Carter, Christian Dylla, Per Thorshøj and a team of enthusiastic local volunteers. The facilities were ideal and we organised the procedure in order to make it more efficient. It seems that this was appreciated by the competitors and this, or an improved system, will be used in the future. One innovation which made sail measurement easier for the volunteers was the use of a full size Mylar sail template, with all the measurements on it.

Sails

The measurement in Miami began with an unwelcome surprise. Two sailors advised me that they had bought new sails and needed fundamental measurement before the regatta. I arrived early and arranged to begin, only to find that there were some 200 sails to be completely measured! The point of this anecdote is to remind all of you that new sails must be fundamentally measured before use, unless they are from sailmakers in Germany, Denmark or other countries with "In House Certification" schemes. We hope to get all Yngling sailmakers to adopt ISAF IHC in the near future so as to eliminate this obligation.

Regatta inspection is not fundamental measurement, and a regatta stamp is not sufficient.

Deck fittings

Some sailors are not aware of the rules limiting the size of holes in the deck. The rule specifies the actual hole cut into the deck moulding, and for some spinnaker turning block dishes these are too big. This is difficult to correct at a regatta so should be checked before leaving home.

Gybing Lines

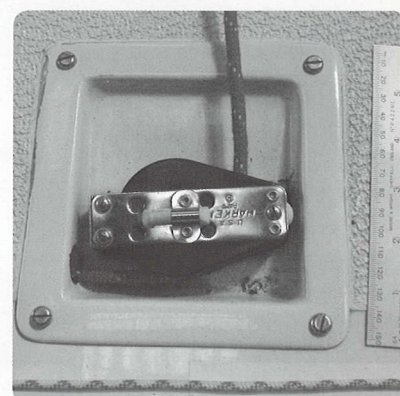
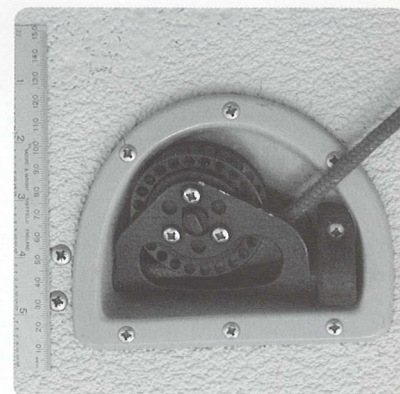
There has been considerable discussion as to whether sailors are allowed to use the "gybing line" for pumping the mainsail. In some instances it is difficult to clearly define where the gybing line ends and the mainsail begins, and exactly how one is allowed to use the mainsheet for pumping. A rule change to clarify the Yngling class pumping rules will be discussed in Kalmar.

Mainsheet blocks

Class rule C.7.2(e)(ii), specifies the height of the mainsheet block attachment point. It should be noted that the rule states "the attachment points of any mainsheet block(s)..." and this means the measurement is made to the pin which secures the block in the boat, not the base of the Harken swivel for the cleat, or the surface of the console on which the block is mounted. As shown in the photo below, some consoles do not comply. Again this is something you should check before leaving home.

2008 has been an eventful year and we look forward to even more exciting Yngling sailing in 2009. I look forward to seeing you all in Kalmar.

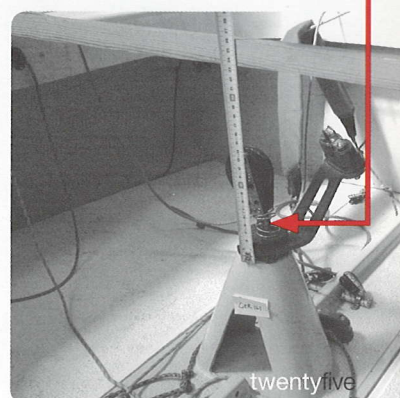
